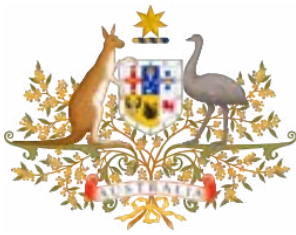

This season we had over 400 nippers join Mets. A very big thank you to everyone who spent so much of their time in managing, organising, training, water safety and keeping all these children safe during the many different nipper activities and their attendance at surf carnivals.

OUR COMMITTEES

Fundraising and Grants: The Fundraising and Grants Committee of which Brent Hiley (Director) is Chairperson and Kerry Barlow, Emily Hiley and Jay Rogan are members. In this, the third year of the committee's operation, it has excelled in securing grants and sponsorships. These have enabled us to replace old equipment, complete much needed clubhouse maintenance and improvements as well as continuing to secure the Club's financial future. We, as members, owe Brent, Kerry, Emily, and Jay a huge debt of gratitude for the work they are doing in securing additional funds for our Club.

A special thanks must go to Kerry Barlow who together with her team of Emily Hiley and Apryl Cordingley raised \$54,229. This was by far the most raised by any Club in Queensland. What a fantastic effort. Thank you.

Foundation: The Foundation Committee consisting of Blake Andrews (Chairperson), Graham Archdall, Glen Forbes, Stephen Maitland and Simon Richards oversee the funds invested for the ongoing development of our members. The Foundation currently has funds of \$374,882. It is my goal to see this grow to \$500,000 over the next two years.

Building Committee: The Building Committee consisting of Jim Chisholm (Chairperson), Ron Youels, John Brannock, Denis Croft, Brian Wooldridge, and Neil Hallagan. I am very grateful to Neil Hallagan who joined the Building Committee as the Club's Asset Maintenance Coordinator and has looked after

all the various maintenance projects carried out at the Clubhouse during the year.

OUR ACHIEVEMENTS

Offsite Storage: We finally received Council approval to build the offsite storage shed with the money received from Gambling Community Grant in 2019. The earthworks and concrete slab were completed on 14 May 2021 with the shed construction due for completion in June.

Property Management: The Clubhouse sub-lease agreement with the Supporters' Club has finally received Council consent for registration after a two-year wait. Unfortunately, there is still no formal license agreement with the Council for the use of the Boatshed and we are

continuing our efforts with the Council to formalise this arrangement.

During the year we have continued to implement our Clubhouse Asset Management Plan with the replacement of the Clubhouse roof, installation of solar panels, building a separate volunteer lifesavers' office, upgrading Clubhouse security and other necessary maintenance needs.

Lifesaving Equipment: The season commenced with the commissioning of our new patrol trailer. Our thanks must go to Steve Maitland who committed many hours of his time in delivering this valuable piece of lifesaving equipment.

During the year we have purchased a range of essential lifesaving equipment, as well as much need nipper boards and equipment.

A highlight of the season was the christening of our new surf boat which was named the "Ron Dittmann" and called "the Ditty" for short. This was achieved through the efforts of "Molly" (Jase Bean) and our "Boaties" in fundraising, securing sponsors, and the sale of the old boat. Their efforts made it financially possible for the Club to commit the additional funds for the building of the new surf boat.

OUR FUTURE

We are extremely lucky in having the financial experience and knowledge of Graham Archdall (Life Member) as Treasurer. The Club is in a strong position thanks to the time and effort he contributes guiding the Board through all the various financial decision we make.

It is our expectation that the 2021/2022 season will commence as normal with social distancing and increased personal safety measures being the "new norm" in all parts of our life. The Annual General Meeting will be held on Saturday 26 June 2021 at 10:00am. This will allow all the pre-season activities to be carried out well before the start of the season in September.

This year, a major focus for the Board will be the securing of funds to redevelop the Kings Beach Surf Life Saving Facility (alias "The Boathouse"). It is becoming virtually impossible to operate out of this facility with the increased equipment necessary for lifesaving activities, the growth of our nippers and its poor state of repair.

I would like to thank everyone who has helped and supported me during the year and more so to all those members who make it very special in just being part of Metropolitan-Caloundra Surf Lifesaving Club.

CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT



Commencing lifesaving down on the Gold Coast in 2015 through the amazing Nipper program for my eldest son Oscar, and finally starting my Bronze Medallion, and Trainer through SLSQ in 2016, we didn't think that we could find another club who would make us feel so at home, and welcome us with open arms like Kurrawa did. Well Mets and the Mets family certainly blew that thought out of the water!

After relocating to the beautiful Kings beach in late 2017, we thought we would start nice and slow with joining a new club. After a year of assisting in an Age Manager and Water Safety Role, and completing my Bronze Medallion, I was welcome by our CTO, and all of our trainers, to join them in training and assisting our new members coming through, our juniors and assist with our proficiencies. Through this all, I was encouraged and supported to complete my Silver, and in 2019 hold the award that would eventually lead to being a PC on one of our awesome Patrol Teams.

These teams and their amazing patrolling members, are the reason why in 2020 I volunteered to take on the role of Club Captain here at Mets, and are the reason why our 2020/21 season was a successful and (mainly) uneventful season.

We faced many challenges, and our season started and ended through a Global Pandemic. We We grew our numbers and now have 229 active patrolling members, and thanks to our Mets family and their love of our beach, we have at least another 20 lined up for our first course of the 2021/22 season. The word around town, thanks to our fundraising crew, our nippers, our members and a season full of fun, is that Mets is the place to be!

You have all performed above and beyond your volunteering responsibilities, and as a result, we were able to meet all of our patrol obligations, through a season with only 1 or 2 minor indiscretions that were handled promptly, many successful rescues, and no lives lost, you performed an incredible 11224.84hrs for the season!

Our Club secured many grants, which has led us to be able to enjoy new equipment, new uniforms, to expand our training and in the near future, we will see upgrades to our Patrol Shed, and Clubhouse. Our Grants officer Brent and President Jim have worked hard to ensure that the club has the equipment we need.

We enjoyed spending time celebrating the successes of the local community, which saw an additional beach wheelchair for people with disabilities to use on our beach, we made connections with our local organisations and even featured in a TV ad!



To each and every one of our patrolling members, their families, and our community - I thank you. Each of you contributed to this season in so many ways.

Your volunteer hours, your diligence and roving surveillance eyes on patrol and in proficiencies, your mentorship of our community and members, your time driving to & from patrol, your support of your family member in their red & yellow, your support of our Surf Woman of The Year WINNER, your fundraising efforts with SOS, your guidance for our new members, your upskilling, your competitive nature for our all of our Nipper, Senior & Master competitors, your bbq cooking skills, your water safety assistance, your willingness to jump on board and lend a hand, and partake in many Ugly Rashie photos, blue mat roll outs, and community service, and your support towards me in this role, has meant that YOU have made my first season as Club Captain a very enjoyable & made 2020/21 season a successful one for our club, and one that our community thanks you for, along with i!

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES PRESIDENT



The 2020/21 nipper season will go on record as one of the most successful in the club's history, we should all be very grateful that we live in a country and a State that is still able to hold a full, largely uninterrupted nipper program during the ongoing COVID events.

MEMBERSHIP

Due to the COVID crisis the club was forced into a position of limiting the number of nippers we were able to accommodate for this season. We were still able to accept 400 kids into our program from green caps to under 15s. We are very excited to be able to open this up further again next season to widen the Mets family even further and continue the enormous growth were experiencing prior to COVID.

SURF SPORTS & COMPETITION RESULTS

Despite COVID our surf sports participation increased further again and our nippers achieved some amazing results across the season.

Mets placed 3rd overall at the Branch titles with 361 points which powered us into the State Titles where we recorded our highest ever points total at North Kirra with 156 points and were 6th overall and 3rd overall on handicap in the State- an amazing result.

The nippers from the under 14s and under 15s that competed in the Australian Titles held on the Sunshine Coast this season performed unbelievably and many Aussie medals returned home with them and our other former nippers now competing in the under 17s and above. Congratulations to you all.

The Mets Beachies were a dominant force all season and placed second overall in the State on overall points and second overall on handicap points in the Qld Beach Series.

Much praise and thanks must go to club coaches Matthew Richards and his assistant Noah Richards, Kerry Thomas and Clint Robinson for the water team and Kerry Barlow and Todd McSwan (Swanny) on the beach, the ongoing time and dedication these people show to our kids is shining through in the results but more importantly in the club spirit and culture that is on display at all events.

Well done to all of our kids from under 8-under 15s that competed for our club this season.

A full summary of the surf sports results for the season is included in the Club Competition Results.

Please note that only results for the U11-U15 carnivals are recorded with placegetters for the top

CHIEF TRAINING OFFICER REPORT

I would like to start by thanking everyone that assisted in whatever capacity during the season (there are too many to name). It has been another busy and demanding year for the club's relatively small but dedicated group of Trainers and Assessors.

With COVID restrictions in place for the first 6 months of the season, there was additional paperwork required and limitations on some types of training.

Once again, the September holidays' 'Lifesaving Camp' was well attended by trainees with 32 attending - 19 new Bronze Medallions (BM) and 13 Surf Rescue Certificates (SRC). There were an additional 2 members that completed their Bronze training in the weeks after the camp. Unfortunately, we were unable to hold a 'livein' camp this year, but it was still just as successful and rewarding. A big "thank you" to all the trainers, water safety and other members that assisted during the seven days.

We ran two more weekend BM/SRC courses for the year (November and January) which resulted in 10 new BM and 17 SRC's. A big thank you to Aleisha Edwards who organised these courses from start to finish.

All the new BM members completed the new Certificate II in Public Safety (Aquatic Rescue) PUA21019 qualification along with all of our existing trainers and assessors. In season 2021/2022 it is expected that the new qualification will be rolled out to all existing BM holders. For the first time, the SRC award also included units of competency which go towards the units required for the BM. This will mean the upgrade from SRC to BM will be a lot more efficient for everyone involved.

We continued to upskill our members this season. We achieved this with 20 new Advanced Resuscitation awards, 25 new First Aid awards, 11 new IRB crew awards, 5 new IRB Driver awards and 8 Beach Management awards.

A special thanks to Aleisha Edwards who took on the role of Assistant Chief Training Officer and tried to get as much information from me as possible throughout the season. Hopefully Aleisha will take on the CTO role either next season or the following one.

Thank you to my wife Kerri and two young children for allowing me to spend the time required in this position.

TREASURER'S FINANCIAL REPORT



COVID saw our season start with major financial restraints. There was uncertainty about what activities would be allowed, and what funds would be available. A call for financial restraint was well supported by all office holders and members. Great leadership by Jim Chisholm set the tone for 20/21.

A full review of our organisational structure was undertaken. The future financial plan was simple. Do what was currently possible and low cost. Patrolling the beach had priority. Major projects needed to be urgent or be highly funded from grants, sponsorship, or other means.

Initially we faced setbacks such as a major failure of the roof over the clubhouse annex. This was not covered by insurance and cost \$24,018. This unexpected expense was funded from the Club's asset management fund.

We kicked off Surf Sports with the Pool Competition and with minimal expenditure achieved the inspiring result of 3rd in Queensland. This was a sign of things to come.

Lifting of the lockdown and restrictions allowed the Club Captain and Patrol Captains to develop procedures to allow Patrols to go ahead. The JAC worked hard to allow 400 nippers to sign on and JAC activities to commence. Membership income was similar to 2019.

Kerry Barlow and her SOS team unleashed strategies for an internet SOS collection. The success of this, fired up the membership to physically collect for two days boosting the amount to \$54,200. The SOS success underwrote the ongoing costs for the season. This boosted Mets confidence and team spirit. We cautiously commenced a full season of patrolling and competition. Congratulations to Kerry, Apryl Cordingley, Emily Hiley and the SOS team for financially kickstarting the 20/21 season.

Adding to our financial success was Eliza Dreves engaging her family, friends, and members to fundraise for the Queensland Surf Woman of the Year. Whilst many contributed to Eliza's success, it is a fact that Eliza is an outstanding member and leader. Eliza, her family, and her team raised \$28,763 on the way to becoming Queensland's Surf Woman of the year. Congratulations Eliza in this year of highlights I think you stole the show.

TREASURER'S FINANCIAL REPORT

Part of the Pandemic was Government support through grants. Brent Hiley did a brilliant job of applying for and obtaining \$101,305 in Grant Funding. Brent also oversaw the signing up of sponsors raising a further \$48,503.

The Supporters Club re-opened in June 2020 and with sound management and great support from the public was able to recommence rent to the Surf Club in January 2021. In addition to the rent the Supporters Club has provided \$55,691 for work done on the Clubhouse.

We finished the season with great success by our competitors at Branch, State and Aussies. Congratulations Matt Richards and all who participated. We were able to fund the Surf Sports due to the hard work of the SOS team, Eliza, the fund-raising committee and sound financial management.

Thanks to all who assisted to raise funds and more importantly those who showed restraint in spending. This measured approach to financial management has put our Club in a strong financial position.

We have improved our cash reserves by \$100,000 and funded projects of \$227,169. These include.

Review of Club Structure, New IRB motor, new Rescue boards and other Patrol equipment, Patrol Trailer, New Fence Spender Lane, New Roof Clubhouse, Solar on Clubhouse, New Surf Boat, Storage Shed, Office and Security upgrade.

2021/22 Financial Challenges include:

Fully funding training, equipping and providing lifesaving services at Kings Beach

EXTRA Fundraising to fund our Surf Sports activities (Aussies in WA).

We will launch new Art Union and Donation internet platforms.

We will obtain funding for the new Surf Lifesaving Facility (new Boatshed)

With sound planning we will achieve these objectives and maintain our strong financial position.

Thanks to my wife Lynda for allowing me to be part of this great organisation.

IT & COVID19 REPORT

This year has been a busy year updating IT systems to ensure we keep pace with technology and secure our systems. We have been improving systems and for the start of the new season we will have a new common Wi-Fi system across the club with a single access point for members and guests. Securing our data is critical and we continue to ensure our data is kept secure. We have commenced projects working with new partners integrating new platforms to sell tickets in the Surf Life Saving Foundation (SLSF) prize home draws; and direct donations to the club - with our new Partner "Shout for Good" - ALL funds raised through the fundraising pages attract no fees meaning we keep all the funds within our club! This fundraising will be directed to our proposed new Surf Life Saving Facility.

COVID continues to impact all of us and we have seen other States and areas of the community impacted and, while we have navigated our way through this challenge, it is essential we continue to follow the guidance of the government with cleaning, checking in and getting vaccinated when you are able to. All these steps will ensure our club remains safe and our community safe - the diligence of the club and its members has ensured our safety and we hope the coming season is less of a challenge. We will have updated check-in processes in-line with government guidance ready for the new season along with a supply of hygiene products to keep us safe.

THE FOUNDATION

Our Foundation funds at the end of April stood at \$324,882. This is an increase of some \$5,600 on the previous year.

This increase occurred after we received donations of \$10,000 during the year and from February to April the Surf Club contributed \$5,600 to the Foundation.

From these funds we made a payment of \$10,000 to the Surf Club for funding Youth Member Development.

In addition to this cash payment, \$350,000 of Foundation funds has been offset against the Club's loan account with the bank. This meant that the loan balance used to calculate interest was reduced accordingly, saving the Surf Club \$6,440 in interest over the twelve months.

BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

This year the focus of the Committee has been on critical maintenance needed on our Clubhouse and the construction of our offsite storage shed. The position of Maintenance Coordinator was formed to address the issues in the building report of 3 February 2019 and Building Committee report of 13 April 2019. We are very fortunate that Neil Hallagan offered his services to take on this huge responsibility. On behalf of the Building Committee, I would like to thank Neil for all the work he has done. The items that have been addressed and managed by Neil in the past year are as follows:

1. A Council Grant has been awarded to a local builder to redesign and lower the drainage around the building and out through the ski shed to the beach, including concreting of ski room floor. No further follow through has occurred and design sits with Council.
2. Water Drainage in south west corner is being monitored as is the crack in the wall. No settlement of base slab has occurred in this region and crack in wall appears to be due to concrete cancer in reinforcement. No further change has occurred.
3. Concrete cancer in Entrance Bridge. The side wall beams that are the structural element of this bridge have been excavated at the base of the beam to inspect the reinforcement. The longitudinal reinforcement is still full size and competent. Further exposure of reinforcement will proceed followed by zinc coating and concrete will be replaced with high strength epoxy. This follows the Structural Engineers inspection of exposed reinforcement. Expect to extend life of bridge by 5- 10 years. No further work has been carried out this year but situation is stable and is inspected quarterly.
4. Roofing replacement to southern tin section. Following severe storms, water entered the full length of the southern dining area. All carpet was replaced under insurance and a contract was let to Stormguard to replace this section of roof. Work was completed in July 2020.
5. Asbestos roof quotations to remove and replace for approx. \$60,000, was awarded to Stormguard and work was completed in two days on the 11th of May 2021. Solar panels will be installed on the 31st of May.
6. Club Off-site Storage Shed is programmed for erection in June and should be complete by time of AGM.
7. Cracking in building is monitored on an ongoing basis, with no further deterioration.
8. Proposal to extend and relocate kitchen have been progressed by the Supporters Club.

FUNDRAISING AND GRANTS COMMITTEE

It was a bumper year for the Club this year on all fronts as the team built on last year's hard work. It was a fantastic, consistent effort by all which provided much needed funds as the club continues to grow and expand its community offerings.

The years fundraising kicked off with a bang when the club came together to "shake the tin" as part of our annual SOS appeal. We had one of our biggest appeals to date, netting over \$53,000!! In the uniform shop and nipper canteen led by Julie-Anne Richards and the Canteen Committee (respectively) it was all hands to the pump with the huge number of nippers this year. Due to their hard work, and those that leant a hand each week, we had another great financial contribution from these essential club outlets. As always, Mets on Kings were massive supporters of the club and their continued efforts in raising funds throughout the year through raffles and the Envirobank bottle collection was greatly appreciated.

The icing on the cake this year was the success of our very own Surf Woman of the Year participant Eliza Dreves who raised a staggering \$28,000. Eliza worked extremely hard all year creating and delivering multiple fundraisers ranging from Nipper-a-thons through to "Summer with Santa" Photo's on the beach. To top it all off Eliza went on to win the event which recognised her fundraising efforts in combination with her advancing of the club's culture and member development, both of which have been felt at all levels of the club. **HUGE CONGRATULATIONS Eliza!!**

FUNDRAISING AND GRANTS COMMITTEE

In the Grants space we had another HUGE year:

- Sunshine Coast Council Major Grant \$7,040 to purchase a new IRB and Motor
- Qld Gov Active Clubs Grant - \$ 2,000 to purchase new nipper boards.
- Andrew Wallace (Federal Member) Stronger Communities Grant - \$9,000 towards the new patrol trailer.
- Sunshine Coast Council Covid Adaptation Grant - \$10,000 towards planning and strategy services to help the club respond to COVID.
- Qld Gov Active Restart Infrastructure Grant - \$4,320 for two new laptops and a marquee
- Sunshine Coast Council Major Grant R2 - \$25,000 to support the replacement of the Asbestos roof on the Senior Club House
- Andrew Wallace (Federal Member) Energy Grant - \$12,500 towards solar to be installed on the new roof. We then secured an additional \$12,500 from solar supplier Resinc under a 12-month sponsorship agreement.
- Queensland Government Fire and Emergency Services Development Fund - \$7,130 for 4 new "foamie" rescue boards and patrols uniforms.
- Beach Safety Equipment Fund - \$5,000 towards the purchase of a new IRB motor
- Andrew Wallace (Federal Member) Volunteer Grant 2021 - \$3,900 Aircon for new office and PA system for Nippers.



FUNDRAISING AND GRANTS COMMITTEE



In total this year the club received \$85,890 in Grant funds. This year's Grants combined with last year's Grants have helped the club achieve some major infrastructure goals including the roof replacement (completed in May), the installation of Solar (Completed in May) and the building of a new 4 bay shed on Caloundra Primary School grounds (currently under construction).

Whilst the Fundraising and Grant success was brilliant it was complimented by another strong, consistent sponsorship result. This year we welcomed a number of new sponsors and welcomed back ALL of our previous sponsors who continue to support the club. 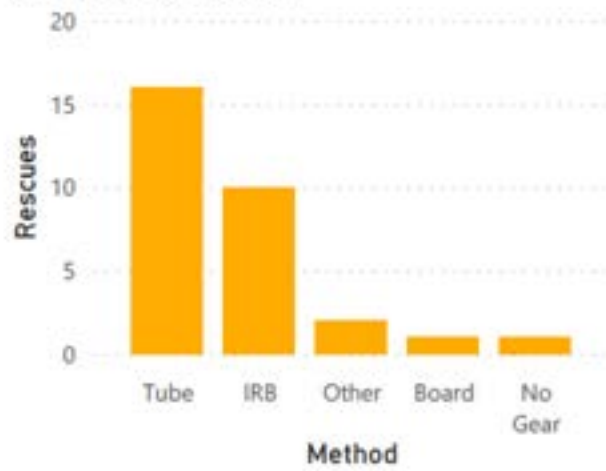

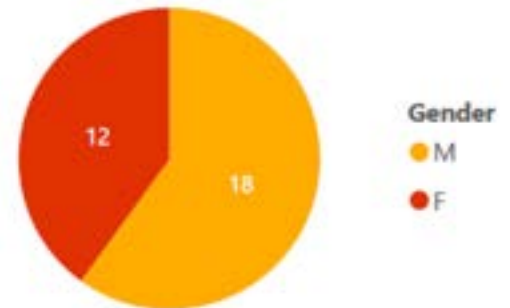

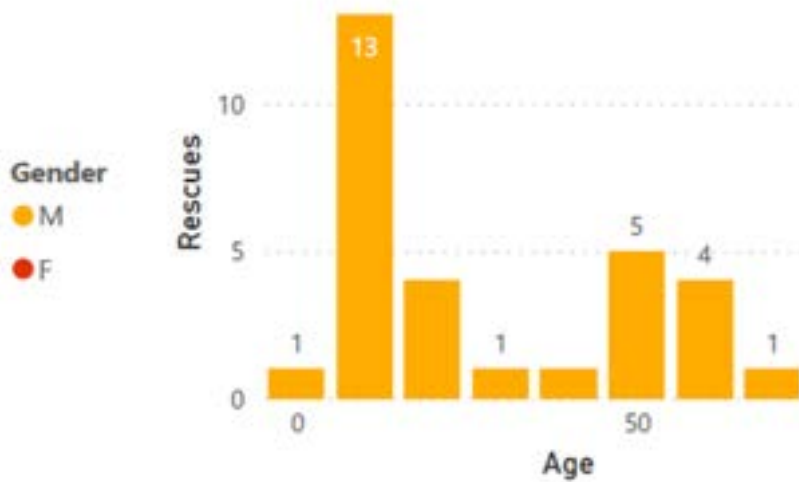
Rescues by Method



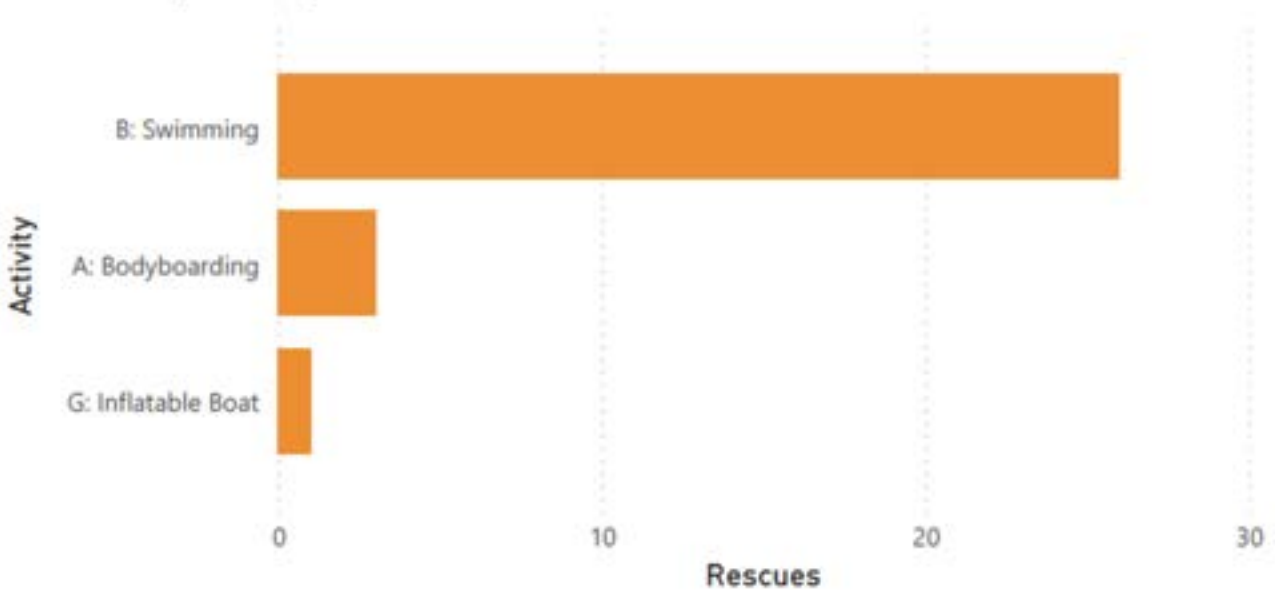
Rescues by Gender

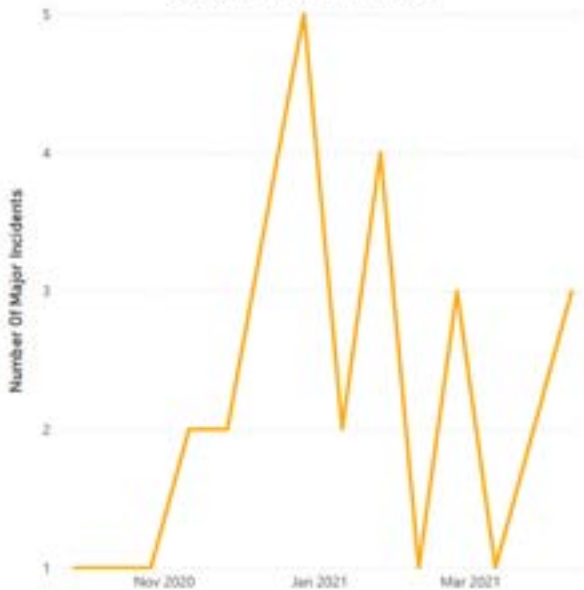

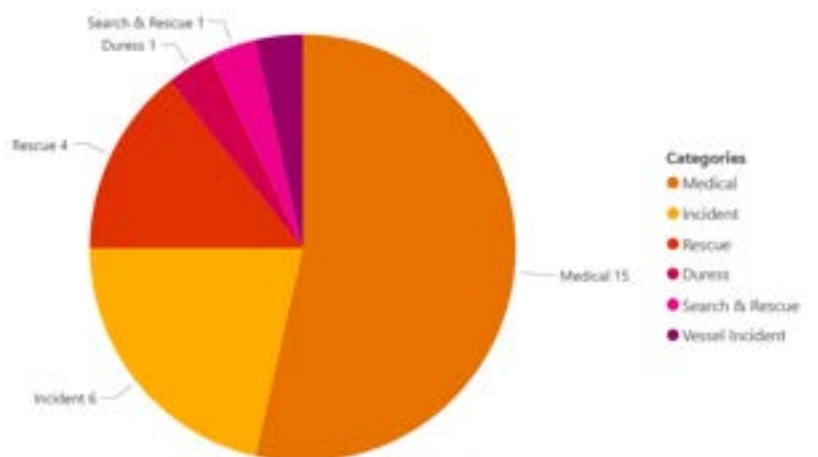

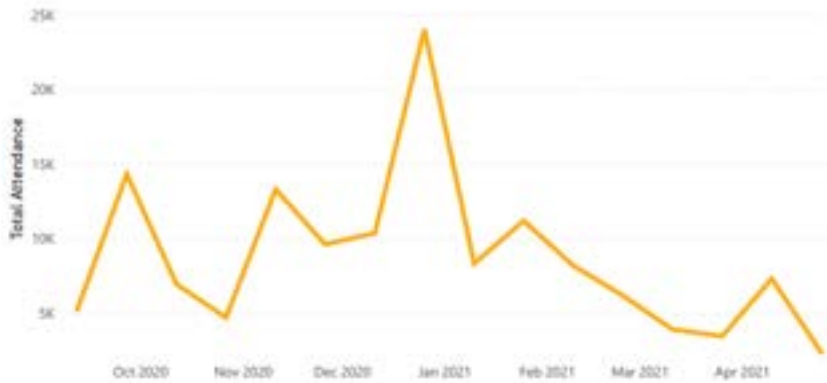

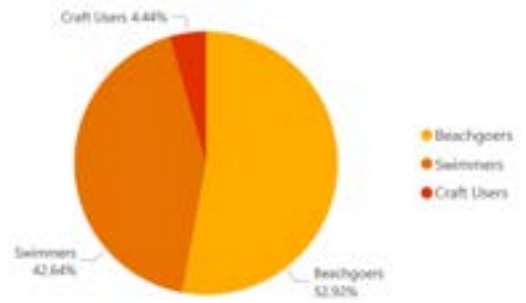

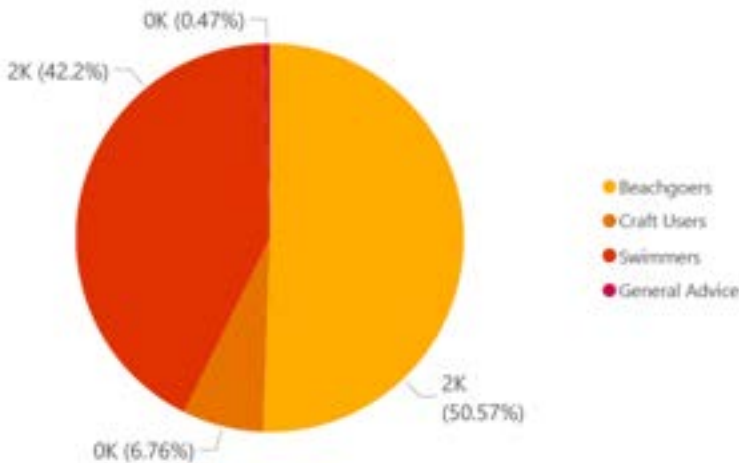

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General Information

The financial statements cover Metropolitan Caloundra Surf Life Saving Club Inc ("the club") as an individual entity.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*. The club is a not-for-profit entity for financial report purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements, except the cash flow information, have been prepared on accrual basis and are based on historical costs, modified where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest Australian dollar.

The financial statements were authorised for issue on 12 June 2021 by the Board of Management.

Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to confirm changes in presentation for the current financial year.

(a) Income Tax

The *Australian Charities and Not-for-profit Commission* have endorsed the association as a charitable institution.

No provision for income tax has been raised as the association is exempt from income tax under Section 50-5 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

(b) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short-term borrowings in current liabilities on the Statement of Financial Position.

(c) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis or fair value as indicated less where applicable, less depreciation and impairment losses.

Property, plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount and impairment losses are recognised either in profit or loss or as a revaluation decrease if the impairment losses relate to a revalued asset. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present (refer to Note 1(f) for details of impairment).

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the club and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are recognised as expenses in profit or loss in the financial period in which they are incurred.

Plant and equipment that have been contributed at no cost or for nominal cost are recognised at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including capitalised leased assets, is depreciated on a diminishing value basis over their estimated useful lives to the club commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of assets are:

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposal are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are included in the statement of profit and loss and other comprehensive income.

(d) Leases

At inception, the Club considers whether a contract is, or contains a lease. A lease is defined as 'a contract, or part of a contract, that conveys the right to use an asset (the underlying asset) for a period of time in exchange for consideration'.

To apply this definition the Club assesses whether the contract meets three key evaluations which are whether:

- the contract contains an identified asset, which is either explicitly identified in the contract or implicitly specified by being identified at the time the asset is made available to the Club;
- the Club has the right to obtain substantially all of the economic benefits from use of the identified asset throughout the period of use, considering its rights within the defined scope of the contract;
- the Club has the right to direct the use of the identified asset throughout the period of use. The Club assess whether it has the right to direct 'how and for what purpose' the asset is used throughout the period of use.

Measurement and recognition of leases as a lessee

At lease commencement date, the Club recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability on the balance sheet. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which is made up of the initial measurement of the lease liability, any initial direct costs incurred by the Club, an estimate of any costs to dismantle and remove the asset at the end of the lease, and any lease payments made in advance of the lease commencement date (net of any incentives received).

The Club depreciates the right-of-use assets on a straight-line basis from the lease commencement date to the earlier of the end of the useful life of the right-of-use asset or the end of the lease term. The Club also assesses the right-of-use asset for impairment when such indicators exist. At the commencement date, the Club measures the lease liability at the present value of the lease payments unpaid at that date, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease if that rate is readily available or the Club's incremental borrowing rate.

Lease payments included in the measurement of the lease liability are made up of fixed payments (including in substance fixed), variable payments based on an index or rate, amounts expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee and payments arising from options reasonably certain to be exercised.

Subsequent to initial measurement, the liability will be reduced for payments made and increased for interest. It is remeasured to reflect any reassessment or modification, or if there are changes in in-substance fixed payments. When the lease liability is remeasured, the corresponding adjustment is reflected in the right-of-use asset, or profit and loss if the right-of-use asset is already reduced to zero.

(d) Leases (continued)

The Club has elected to account for short-term leases and leases of low-value assets using the practical expedients. Instead of recognising a right-of-use asset and lease liability, the payments in relation to these are recognised as an expense in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the lease term. On the statement of financial position, right-of-use assets have been included in property, plant and equipment and lease liabilities have been included in trade and other payables.

The Club as a lessor

As a lessor, the Club classifies its leases as either operating or finance leases. A lease is classified as a finance lease if it transfers substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership of the underlying asset and classified as an operating lease if it does not.

(e) Financial Instruments

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the association becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is the date that the association commits itself to either the purchase or sale of the asset (ie trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments (except for trade receivables) are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs, except where the instrument is classified "at fair value through profit or loss", in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Trade receivables are initially measured at the transaction price if the trade receivables do not contain significant financing component or if the practical expedient was applied as specified in AASB 15: Revenue from Contracts with Customers.

Classification and Subsequent Measurement of Financial Assets

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are subsequently measured at:

- amortised cost; or
- fair value through profit or loss.

A financial liability is measured at fair value through profit or loss if the financial liability is:

- a contingent consideration of an acquirer in a business combination to which AASB 3: Business Combinations applies;
- held for trading; or
- initially designated as at fair value through profit or loss.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a debt instrument and of allocating interest expense over in profit or loss over the relevant period.

The effective interest rate is the internal rate of return of the financial asset or liability. That is, it is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash flows through the expected life of the instrument to the net carrying amount at initial recognition.

A financial liability is held for trading if it is:

- incurred for the purpose of repurchasing or repaying in the near term;
- part of a portfolio where there is an actual pattern of short-term profit-taking; or
- a derivative financial instrument (except for a derivative that is in a financial guarantee contract or a derivative that is in effective hedging relationships).

Any gains or losses arising on changes in fair value are recognised in profit or loss to the extent that they are not part of a designated hedging relationship.

The change in fair value of the financial liability attributable to changes in the issuer's credit risk is taken to other comprehensive income and is not subsequently reclassified to profit or loss. Instead, it is transferred to retained earnings upon derecognition of the financial liability.

If taking the change in credit risk in other comprehensive income enlarges or creates an accounting mismatch, then these gains or losses should be taken to profit or loss rather than other comprehensive income.

A financial liability cannot be reclassified.

A financial asset that meets the following conditions is subsequently measured at other comprehensive income:

- the contractual terms within the financial asset give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding on specified dates; and
- the business model for managing the financial asset comprises both contractual cash flows collection and the selling of the financial asset.

By default, all other financial assets that do not meet the measurement conditions of amortised cost and fair value through other comprehensive income are subsequently measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The association initially designates a financial instrument as measured at fair value through profit or loss if:

- it eliminates or significantly reduces a measurement or recognition inconsistency (often referred to as an "accounting mismatch") that would otherwise arise from measuring assets or liabilities or recognising the gains and losses on them on different bases;
- it is in accordance with the documented risk management or investment strategy and information about the groupings is documented appropriately, so the performance of the financial liability that is part of a group of financial liabilities or financial assets can be managed and evaluated consistently on a fair value basis; and
- it is a hybrid contract that contains an embedded derivative that significantly modifies the cash flows otherwise required by the contract.

The initial designation of financial instruments to measure at fair value through profit or loss is a one-time option on initial classification and is irrevocable until the financial asset is derecognised.

Equity Instruments

At initial recognition, as long as the equity instrument is not held for trading or not a contingent consideration recognised by an acquirer in a business combination to which AASB 3 applies, the association made an irrevocable election to measure any subsequent changes in fair value of the equity instruments in other comprehensive income, while the dividend revenue received on underlying equity instruments investment will still be recognised in profit or loss.

Regular way purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised and derecognised at settlement date in accordance with the association's accounting policy.

Derecognition

Derecognition refers to the removal of a previously recognised financial asset or financial liability from the statement of financial position.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

A liability is derecognised when it is extinguished (ie when the obligation in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires). An exchange of an existing financial liability for a new one with substantially modified terms, or a substantial modification to the terms of a financial liability, is treated as an extinguishment of the existing liability and recognition of a new financial liability.

The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable, including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

Derecognition of financial assets

A financial asset is derecognised when the holder's contractual rights to its cash flows expires, or the asset is transferred in such a way that all the risks and rewards of ownership are substantially transferred.

All the following criteria need to be satisfied for the derecognition of a financial asset:

- the right to receive cash flows from the asset has expired or been transferred;
- all risk and rewards of ownership of the asset have been substantially transferred; and
- the association no longer controls the asset (ie has no practical ability to make unilateral decision to sell the asset to a third party).

On derecognition of a financial asset measured at amortised cost, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss.

On derecognition of a debt instrument classified as fair value through other comprehensive income, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the investment revaluation reserve is reclassified to profit or loss.

On derecognition of an investment in equity which the association elected to classify under fair value through other comprehensive income, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the investment's revaluation reserve is not reclassified to profit or loss, but is transferred to retained earnings.

Impairment

The association recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses on:

- loan commitments that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss; and
- financial guarantee contracts that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss.

Loss allowance is not recognised for:

- financial assets measured at fair value through profit or loss; or
- equity instruments measured at fair value through other comprehensive income.

Expected credit losses are the probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of a financial instrument. A credit loss is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due and all cash flows expected to be received, all discounted at the original effective interest rate of the financial instrument.

The association uses the following approaches to impairment, as applicable under AASB 9: Financial Instruments:

- the general approach;
- the simplified approach;
- the purchased or originated credit-impaired approach; and
- low credit risk operational simplification.

General approach

Under the general approach, at each reporting period, the association assesses whether the financial instruments are credit-impaired, and:

- if the credit risk of the financial instrument has increased significantly since initial recognition, the association measures the loss allowance of the financial instruments at an amount equal to the lifetime expected credit losses; and
- if there is no significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, the association measures the loss allowance for that financial instrument at an amount equal to 12-month expected credit losses.

Simplified approach

The simplified approach does not require tracking of changes in credit risk at every reporting period, but instead requires the recognition of lifetime expected credit loss at all times.

This approach is applicable to:

- trade receivables; and

In measuring the expected credit loss, a provision matrix for trade receivables is used taking into consideration various data to get to an expected credit loss (ie diversity of its customer base, appropriate groupings of its historical loss experience, etc).

Purchased or originated credit-impaired approach

For financial assets that are considered to be credit-impaired (not on acquisition or originations), the association measures any change in its lifetime expected credit loss as the difference between the asset's gross carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate. Any adjustment is recognised in profit or loss as an impairment gain or loss.

Evidence of credit impairment includes:

- significant financial difficulty of the issuer or borrower;
- a breach of contract (eg default or past due event);
- a lender has granted to the borrower a concession, due to the borrower's financial difficulty, that the lender would not otherwise consider;
- the likelihood that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; and
- the disappearance of an active market for the financial asset because of financial difficulties.

Low credit risk operational simplification approach

If a financial asset is determined to have low credit risk at the initial reporting date, the association assumes that the credit risk has not increased significantly since initial recognition and, accordingly, can continue to recognise a loss allowance of 12-month expected credit loss.

To make such a determination that the financial asset has low credit risk, the association applies its internal credit risk ratings or other methodologies using a globally comparable definition of low credit risk.

A financial asset is considered to have low credit risk if:

- there is a low risk of default by the borrower;
- the borrower has a strong capacity to meet its contractual cash flow obligations in the near term; and
- adverse changes in economic and business conditions in the longer term may, but will not necessarily, reduce the ability of the borrower to fulfil its contractual cash flow obligations.

A financial asset is not considered to carry low credit risk merely due to existence of collateral, or because a borrower has a lower risk of default than the risk inherent in the financial assets, or relative to the credit risk of the jurisdiction in which it operates.

Recognition of expected credit losses in financial statements

At each reporting date, the association recognises the movement in the loss allowance as an impairment gain or loss in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

The carrying amount of financial assets measured at amortised cost includes the loss allowance relating to that asset.

Assets measured at fair value through other comprehensive income are recognised at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in other comprehensive income. The amount in relation to change in credit risk is transferred from other comprehensive income to profit or loss at every reporting period.

For financial assets that are unrecognised (eg loan commitments yet to be drawn, financial guarantees), a provision for loss allowance is created in the statement of financial position to recognise the loss allowance.

(f) Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the club reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less cost to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the assets carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the statement of comprehensive income.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the club estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

(g) Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the club's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may not satisfy vesting requirements. Those cash outflows are discounted using market yields on corporate bonds with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cash flows attributable to employee benefits. Contributions are made by the club to employee superannuation funds and are charged as expenses when incurred.

(h) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the club has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(i) Revenue Recognition

Contributed Assets

The club receives assets from the government and other parties from time to time for nil or nominal consideration in order to further its objectives. These assets are recognised in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable accounting standards (for example AASB 9, AASB 16, AASB 116 and AASB 138.)

On initial recognition of an asset, the club recognises related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer).

The club recognises income immediately in profit or loss as the difference between initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amount.

Operating Grants, Donations and Bequests

When the club receives operating grant revenue, donations or bequests, it assesses whether the contract is enforceable and has sufficiently specific performance obligations in accordance with AASB 15.

When both these conditions are satisfied, the club: - identifies each performance obligation relating to the grant - recognises a contract liability for its obligations under the agreement

- recognises revenue as it satisfies its performance obligations. Where the contract is not enforceable or does not have sufficiently specific performance obligations, the club:
- recognises the asset received in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable accounting standards (for example, AASB 9, AASB 16, AASB 116 and AASB 138)
- recognises related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer)
- recognises income immediately in profit or loss as the difference between the initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amount.

(i) Revenue Recognition (continued)

If a contract liability is recognised as a related amount above, the club recognises income in profit or loss when or as it satisfies its obligations under the contract.

Capital Grant

When the club receives a capital grant, it recognises a liability for the excess of the initial carrying amount of the financial asset received over any related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer) recognised under other Australian Accounting Standards.

The club recognises income in profit or loss when or as the club satisfies its obligations under the terms of the grant.

Interest Income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

Revenue from the sale of goods

Revenue from sale of goods comprises revenue earned from sale of goods donated and resale. Sales revenue is recognised when the control of goods passes to the customer.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST) where applicable.

(j) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities, which are recoverable from or payable to the ATO, are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

(k) Trade and Other Receivables

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from customers for goods sold in the ordinary course of business. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Accounts receivable are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

(l) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated costs of completion and selling expenses.

(m) Trade and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the club during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(n) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The Board of Management evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the club.

Key Estimates – Impairment

The Board of Management assess impairment at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the club that may lead to the impairment of assets. Where an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. Value-in-use calculations performed in assessing recoverable amounts incorporate a number of key estimates.

No impairment has been recognised in respect of the current year.

Performance obligations under AASB 15

To identify a performance obligation under AASB 15, the promise must be sufficiently specific to be able to determine when the obligation is satisfied. Management exercises judgement to determine whether the promise is sufficiently specific by taking into account any conditions specified in the arrangement, explicit or implicit, regarding the promised goods or services. In making this assessment, management includes the nature/ type, cost/ value, quantity and the period of transfer related to the goods or services promised.

(o) Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities

The club measures some of its assets and liabilities at fair value on either a recurring or nonrecurring basis, depending on the requirements of the applicable Accounting Standard.

Fair value is the price the club would receive to sell an asset or would have to pay to transfer a liability in an orderly (i.e. unforced) transaction between independent, knowledgeable and willing market participants at the measurement date.

As fair value is a market-based measure, the closest equivalent observable market pricing information is used to determine fair value. Adjustments to market values may be made having regard to the characteristics of the specific asset or liability. The fair values of assets and liabilities that are not traded in an active market are determined using one or more valuation techniques. These valuation techniques maximise, to the extent possible, the use of observable market data.

(p) Economic Dependence

The Club is dependent upon the ongoing receipt of donations and rental income from Metropolitan Caloundra Surf Life Saving Supporters Club to ensure the ongoing continuance of its operations. At the date of this report, the Board of Management has no reason to believe that this financial support will not continue.

(q) New and Amended Accounting Policies Adopted by the Club

AASB 2018-7: Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Definition of Material

This amendment principally amends AASB 101 and AASB 108 by refining the definition of material by improving the wording and aligning the definition across the standards issues by the AASB.
