PRESIDENT'S REPORT

We certainly live in interesting times. Although our season officially ended at the beginning of May it finished much earlier in a rather disjointed manner due to the COVID-19 restrictions. The cancellation of competition, suspension of nippers, taking down the flags and operation of surveillance patrols until the season end, social distancing and the ban on social gatherings has not allowed me to personally thank you, our members, for all you have done for our Club during the year. On top of this our Supporters Club was forced to close impacting the livelihood of the



wonderful staff whose efforts help support our Club.

Our Members

Thank you for making Metropolitan-Caloundra Surf Lifesaving Club special and an enjoyable club of which to be a part. To all our volunteer lifesavers who gave up their time each weekend over this past season to keep safe all the people who come to our beach, your effort and dedication is truly appreciated. Congratulations to the many lifesavers who gained additional awards over the season, I know there were a lot, well done. This season we had over 400 nippers join Mets. A very big thank you to everyone who spent so much of their time in managing, organising, training, water safety and keeping all these children safe during the many different nipper activities and their attendance at surf carnivals.

Our Operations Team

I would like to thank our operations team of Dan Dwyer (Club Captain) Glen Dittmann (JAC), Ben Gaske (Member Development), and Matthew Richards (Surf Sports). The time and effort that each of you contributed to the operation and success of our Club is appreciated. Special thanks to Eliza Dreves who contributes countless hours to the club in whatever area needs assistance. Especially, Eliza's work with Ben Gaske and Kirsten Phillips in the development of our junior members is appreciated and can be recognised in the skills and abilities demonstrated by all our cadet lifesavers when they join the various patrols. Thank you.

Our Board

This year, three new members joined the Board. Graham Archdall (Life Member) joined as Treasurer, Leah Mooney joined as Secretary, and Ed Connolly joined as a Director and was asked to oversee our Information Technology (IT) and Security. We are very fortunate that each has extensive experience in these roles. I would like to thank Leah, Graham and Ed together with Sharon Punter (Vice President), Paula Ryan and Brent Hiley for the time and effort that they have committed in helping guide our Club through the challenges of this past year.

Our Supporters' Club

I would like to thank the Supporters' Club Board and Management Team for its operation of Mets on Kings and the support and contributions provided to the Surf Club to help meet its ongoing financial needs. Although severely impacted by the COVID-19 restrictions, we are confident that the plans and actions put in place will see a successful reopening of the Supporter's Club in July.

Our Committees

Our committees are a vital part of the governance and ongoing development of the Surf Club. I would like to thank the members of the following committees for all your work during the last year.

Fundraising and Grants

The Fundraising and Grants Committee of which Brent Hiley (Director) is Chairperson and Kerry Barlow, Emily Hiley and Ben Mayes are members. In this, the second year of the committee's operation, it has excelled in securing grants and sponsorships. These have not only enabled us to replace old equipment and complete many needed building repairs, it has put the club in



a strong financial position to handle the economic impact of the COVID-19 crisis. We, as members, owe Brent, Kerry, Emily, and Ben a huge debt of gratitude for the work they are doing in securing additional funds for our Club.

Foundation

The Foundation Committee consisting of Blake Andrews (Chairperson), Glen Forbes, Stephen Maitland and Simon Richards manage the funds invested for the ongoing development of our members. The Foundation currently has funds of \$369,272 with an investment target of \$500,000. This is a growth of just under \$55,000 for the year thanks to donations from Estates and individuals and monthly contributions from the Surf Club.

Building Committee

The Building Committee consisting of Ron Youels (Chairperson), John Brannock, Denis Croft, Brian Wooldridge, and Neil Hallagan provide advice on the management of our buildings. As a consequence of last year's structural audit, we now have an Asset Management Plan for the Clubhouse and are working through the issues in a prioritised manner. I am very grateful to Neil Hallagan who joined the Building Committee as the Club's Asset Maintenance Coordinator and has looked after all the various maintenance projects carried out at the Clubhouse during the year.

Offsite Storage

We have now secured a Gambling Community Grant which will enable the offsite storage shed and trailer park to be built on the land provided by Caloundra State School. We are currently awaiting Council and Government certification of the proposed shed.

OUR ACHEIVEMENTS

Property Management

The Clubhouse and Kiosk now have sub-lease agreements in place with the Supporter's Club (still not registered by Council!) that provide the necessary rights and protection of each party. Unfortunately, there is still no formal license agreement with the Council for the use of the Boatshed and we are endeavouring to formalise this arrangement to ensure the safety and protection of our members using this building.

Lifesaving Equipment

During the year we have purchased a range of essential lifesaving equipment, replaced the IRB trailers, purchased a new IRB and motor, and commenced the building of our new patrol trailer in preparation for next season. The new patrol trailer has been made possible by a grant from the Federal Government and a major sponsorship from Henzells Real Estate.

Our Future

The Club is in a strong position financially which will enable us to work our way through an uncertain future caused by the COVID-19 crisis. We are very lucky in having the financial experience and knowledge of Graham Archdall as Treasurer, and the Board have put in place a range of policies to carefully manage our finances. It is our expectation that the 2020/2021 season will commence as normal (or nearly normal) with social distancing and increased personal safety measures being the "norm". We are planning for our deferred Annual General Meeting to be held in the morning of Saturday 08 August 2020 with our Annual Club Awards night to be held that same night (subject to COVID-19 restrictions). It is hoped that this will allow us to celebrate as a re-united club just prior to the commencement of the new season.

This year, I would like to put in place additional member development options for our younger members undertaking tertiary education. This would take the form of mentor opportunities where young people studying can be part of the operation of our club as "Assistant to" different officers or just gain knowledge and network opportunities by being mentored by older experienced members who are involved in their chosen area of study. It is hoped that this type

of program will help them in their chosen professions and personal development as well as keeping them connected with our Club.

I would like to thank everyone who has helped and supported me during the year and more so to all those members who make it very special in just being part of Metropolitan-Caloundra Surf Lifesaving Club.

Through the diligence and hard work of the chief training officer and other club members, we have managed to upskill our existing members with new awards and train new members for their bronze medallion. This has enabled us to provide a lot more flexibility and knowledge across our patrol teams.



The club has been very fortunate to receive several grants and donations over the past few years, which has enabled us to replace and rotate our patrolling equipment when required. Thank you to those members that have assisted in obtaining this funding.

The last few months certainly had its challenges with the COVID-19 situation, with patrols going back to surveillance only and the challenges it presented.

SURF SPORTS REPORT

At the time of writing this report on the 2019/2020 season, the club, surf sports and many aspects of life in general are still very much on hold. In a scenario that is unprecedented in our lifetime, with the season ending Queensland and Australian Championships all being cancelled due to the Covid-19 pandemic that has swept the world and impacted our lives so significantly. And whilst at first there was bitter disappointment for so many, in hindsight what we as a Club missed out on is relatively inconsequential in the big scheme of things. And we can have faith that at some point in the future, a new normal will still see Metropolitan

Caloundra SLSC being represented in Surf Life Saving competition.



When I took on the role of Surf Sports Officer a few season ago, part of that process was assisting the Club in formulating a 5-year plan/strategy for Surf Sports within the overall context of the Club's 5 year plan. Less than 2 years into that plan, I can confidently say that we have met a number of our short term goals and are largely on track with respect to achieving what we set out to deliver for the Club over the longer term.

As a Club we are continuing to develop and offer training programs to our members across a larger number of areas within

Surf Sports; we are seeing an increased number of members participating in that training; we are providing alternative pathways for existing and new members to transition to other areas of Surf Sports (including Pool Rescue, Surf Boats, Board Riding & Surf Skis) and most importantly creating a culture whereby Surf Sports competitors are enthusiastic and positive participants in lifesaving and fundraising obligations.

We also saw for the first time in several years a Surf Sports Camp for U14-U17 members at Rainbow Beach, followed by a Nipper Camp for U10-U13 members at Mooloolaba (due to conditions). I felt both camps were a great success and we are looking to build on both in the coming season.

We have also seen a number of the items identified as being required to execute on our strategy being delivered – as a Club we have provided our members with access to first classmcoaching resources; we are starting to build a support crew around our surf sports competitors; we have in principle approval from the Club to purchase a new Surf Boat and Surf Skis and are in the process of having a new storage facility built to better house surf sports equipment; and over the last two seasons we have received unwavering support from the Club Board with respect to our funding requests to deliver on this Strategy.



I would like to thank the Board, in particular Jim Chisolm as President, Graham Archdall as Treasurer and Brent Hiley as Marketing & Sponsorship Officer for their continued support of Surf Sports and commitment to allowing myself and the Surf Sports Committee to continue following our Strategy. I would also like to say a heart-felt thanks to Kay Blokkeerus in the office for her ongoing support and assistance in so many areas. Even though our longer term goals in Surf Sports extend well beyond where we currently are as a Club, we are seeing significant achievements as a Club in Surf Sports as we move along that path against much larger and better resourced clubs. **Some highlights of the 2019/2020 season include:**

10th PLACE OVERALL OUT OF 21 CLUBS AT QUEENSLAND BOARD RIDING CHAMPIONSHIPS

5TH PLACE OVERALL OUT OF 42 CLUBS AT QUEENSLAND BEACH SERIES

& ZARA RICHTERS WINNING U14 AGE CHAMPION

For our club to achieve these fantastic results across a number of disciplines at a Branch, State and National level on a total budget for the season of less than \$35,000 is a credit to everyone involved in surf sports in our club.

All carnival results are published separately in the Annual Report, and I would encourage all Club Members to read through these results to understand the incredible achievements of so many of your fellow club members. Over the last season our Club has seen several Queensland and Australian champions and medallists across Pool Rescue, Endurance and Board Riding, with all results a testament to the hard work and dedication of so many. I would particularlylike to highlight the Club's third placing at the Sunshine Coast Junior (U11-U15) Branch Championships. To our knowledge, this is the first time in at least 30 years and possibly in the history of the Club that we have achieved a top 3 placing at Junior Branch, and we had a team of 81 junior competitors ready to represent the Club at the Qld Junior State Championships. So well done to everyone involved.

I would also like to say a big thank you to Carl Perkins – Carl started the year as the Club water coach and the success he has had in the short time he has been coaching was reflected in him being approached to take on the vacant role of Sunshine Coast Branch Team Head Water Coach. Unfortunately, due to work and personal commitments, Carl had to step down from his role with the club and he has certainly been missed. I would like to thank in particular David Warren and Pat Gardiner, who have both greatly assisted in helping the club to continue to deliver training sessions for our members in Carl's absence.

The Club also expanded its utilisation of external coaches to supplement what we could offer from within our own membership, and I believe these were extremely successful partnerships that we hope to continue with into the future. We were extremely fortunate to have Summer Short (Pool Rescue), Todd McSwan (Beach) and Clint Robinson & Kerri Thomas (Board/Iron) play a significant role in sharing their knowledge, experience and expertise with so many of our members.

I would like to finish this report by thanking so many people that have assisted with and played a role in Surf Sports over the last season – Kerry Barlow (Beach), Jase Bean (Surf Boats), Craig Spender (Surf Skis), Karen Magnussen (Pool Rescue), Chris O'Shea (Board Riding), Ange Crowe (Junior Team Manager), Jacob Thomson (Senior Team Manager) and Danielle Dunshea (Officials Coordinator). Additional thanks go to every member that has helped with officiating, water safety, IRB driving and crewing (particularly Phill Ashworth), bus driving, towing trailers and generally helping out. I look forward to seeing many of you on the beach in the coming season.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Membership

The Met's nipper program saw strong growth from last season with 439 kids participating from green caps to under 15 this season. That's a rise of 15% on the 2018/19 season. 2019/20 also saw the introduction of the Learner Lifesaver program for children aged from 3-5 years old. This was a seven-week program that Mets ran as a pilot for Surf Lifesaving QLD for a limited (17) number of children and was extremely well received and efficiently orchestrated and run by Kirsten Philips. This will no doubt lead to its introduction to other clubs around the State.

Surf Sports and Competition Results

Surf sports participation increased further on last season and prior to COVID-19 Met's were on track to send our biggest team ever to the State Titles. Unfortunately, COVID-19 caused the cancellation of both the Queensland Junior State Titles to be held at Alexandra Headland and the Australian Junior Championships to be held at North Burleigh robbing the older kids of their chance to put their skills to the test and validate all of their hard training for the season.

Regardless of that, Met's kids proved throughout the season that teamwork makes the dream work! Met's placed 3rd overall at the Branch Titles which is up there with one of the club's best point's result ever! Fifth overall in the highly competitive Queensland Beach Series (2nd overall on Handicap!). Much praise and thanks towards these results must go to club coaches Matthew Richards and his assistant Noah Richards for the water team and Kerry Barlow and Todd McSwan (Swanny) on the beach, the dedication of these people is amazing and is further strengthening our strong club culture and team spirit.

Our under 8 to under 10 kids showed in their limited carnival opportunities that Mets future is in good hands with many wonderful results and most importantly they showed enormous club spirit

cheering on their team mates, and other club's competitors across the line. Well done kids.

A full summary of the surf sports results for the season is included in the Club Competition Results. Please note that only results for the U11-U15 carnivals are recorded with placegetters for the top six earning points for our club. The U8-U10 carnivals are non-competitive and are based on participation, preparing them for competition once they reach under 11.

TRAINING REPORT

It has been another busy and demanding year for the club's relatively small but dedicated group of Trainers and Assessors. I would like to start by thanking everyone that assisted in whatever capacity during the season (there are too many to name).



Once again, the September holidays' 'Lifesaving Camp' was well attended by trainees with 35 attending – 16 new Bronze Medallions (BM) and 19 Surf Rescue Certificates (SRC). A big "thank you" to all the trainers, water safety and other members that assisted during the seven-day camp. The feedback from members was fantastic.

We ran two more weekend BM/SRC course for the year (November and February) which resulted in 12 new BM and 5 SRC's. We also had another 5 members complete the upgrade for the Certificate II in Public Safety (previously held their Bronze Medallion).

IRB Driver Course

One of our main objectives this season was to upskill as many existing members as possible. We achieved this with 18 new Advanced Resuscitation awards, 18 new First Aid awards, 19 new IRB

crew awards, 8 new IRB Driver awards and 12 new SSV awards. We also had 1 returning member complete their unit of competency for their existing IRB crew award. Please refer to detailed Member Qualification statistics elsewhere in this report.

A special thanks to all of our qualified assessors who were required to complete some timeconsuming professional development courses in order to maintain their assessor qualifications. For some, this was 3 full days of classroom training with additional homework.

At the end of the season, the new Certificate II in Public Safety (Aquatic Rescue) guidelines were released. This will mean new Bronze Medallion trainees will receive the PUA21019 qualification, and over the next 2 years all existing Bronze holders will need to upgrade from

PUA21012. At the same time, the SRC award has been upgraded and trainees will now receive specific units of competency that will go towards their Bronze Medallion.

Thank you to my wife Kerri and two young children for allowing me to spend the time required in this position.

TREASURER'S REPORT

What an interesting year this was!

Restructure of Balance Sheets of Supporters Club and Surf Club



We started with a restructure of the financial relationship between the Surf Club and the Supporters Club. In recognition that the building at Spender Lane belongs to the Surf Club, the loan the Supporters club had for the last major renovation was transferred to the Surf Club. To offset this rent from the Supporters Club was increased from \$4,000 per month to \$20,000 per month. This commenced in July 2019 and continued until February 2020. Rent payments then ceased due to COVID-19.

The Surf Club Board who orchestrated these changes in 2019 took a very wise view of what to do with the increased rent. It has been allocated as follows.

- \$8,000 per month went to reduce the Surf Club's loan.
- \$1,800 per month went to the Foundation Account. A total of \$16,200 for the year.
- \$1,200 per month went to an Equipment Reserve account. (to fund lifesaving equipment purchases)
- \$6,000 per month went to a Building Reserve account. (to fund repairs and future building projects).

This leaves \$3,000 per month from the rent to fund day-to-day operations of the Surf Club. This is \$1,000 per month lower than 2019. Thanks to the restraint of the operational departments and by seeking grants, sponsorship and donations for all major projects, there has been an improvement in the liquidity of the club.

Current position re bank accounts and loans is due to sound decisions by the 2019 and 2020 boards, rent being allocated to reserves, hard work by operational heads, and success of the Grants and Sponsors group headed up by Brent Hiley and co-ordinated by Jim Chisholm.

Grants, Sponsors and Donations

The club has excelled in gaining Grants, Sponsors and Donations in 2019/2020.

Sponsorship of \$34,503 up by \$30,503 from last year. Major sponsors were HM Developments, Henzell's Agency, and Candice Care. Sponsorship for specific programs such as the JAC State Titles Uniforms, Patrol Trailer, and a Patrol Marquee.

Mets SLSC Donations were \$17,231 up by \$11,040 from last year. Patrolling member Neil Anderson of McCormick Foods Australia Foods was a major donor with other individuals who regularly donate continuing their support.

Capital Grants were \$109,860. The standout being the 2 year \$50,000 JAC Stockland grant. \$74,067 is held in income in advance. This includes \$35,000 (Gambling Grant for a storage shed), \$9,900 (Federal Infrastructure Grant for a patrol trailer), and \$29,167 yet to be spent of the Stockland Grant for the JAC.





Patrol Tent, Purchased by Caloundra Eyewear Grants spent in 2019/20 totalled \$35,793. JAC (Stocklands Grant \$20,833), IRB Motor and Manikins (Sunshine Coast Council Grants \$12,960) and Sport and Recreation grants \$2,000 for equipment).

Sponsorships, Donations and Grants in 2020 were \$197,555. A great effort by the many involved.

Fundraising, SOS Appeal, Camps and Events

Much hard work goes into these projects and events. Overall this area met budget. Kerry Barlow led a very

enthusiastic team to increase the SOS by 33%. Thanks Kerry. Camps and development events were held that were very successful and whilst being above budget in the accounts, provided excellent value to those that attended. Art Unions, Chocolates (Gary Jones and Kay), and Clothing (Julianne Richards) were areas which contributed to profit. Thanks to those mentioned and other members who assisted.

Operational and Administration Expenses were kept under control. These areas cost only \$7,500 more in 2020 than in 2019. Whilst the season was 1.5 months shorter, Operational areas had controlled their expenditure throughout the year. So COVID-19 had little impact on reducing expenses.

For example, Surf Sports only spent \$35,513 of a budget of \$47,050. The coaching budget was fully spent due to the need to employ coaches to replace the loss of volunteer coaches. Savings were in carnival nominations \$5,035 less than budget, and general and repair expenses down \$5,951.

JAC expenditure was lower than budgeted. JAC had lower carnival nominations, obtained sponsors for State Uniforms (Sponsors), and unfortunately did not have Presentation expenses (COVID-19).

Member development ran successful camps and events but was unable to take part in the final events of the year due to COVID-19

Summary

The club is in a strong financial position due to hard work. We have a challenge ahead of us, but careful planning and execution will see us not only weather this crisis but prosper by taking every opportunity that presents itself.

I thank Kay Blokkeerus for making my job easier. Kay gets all the jobs no one else wants. Kay follows up on everything. Coaching, camps, events, the SOS etc would not happen without Kay.

To all the other board members and operational heads, thank you in assisting me to navigate the complexities of modern surf clubs. We are blessed with having smart, hard-working, people at Mets.

Special mention to President Jim who spends countless hours guiding the Club. His selfless dedication helped me greatly in doing my job. Thanks Jim.

Final thanks goes to my wife Lynda, and family who have supported and encouraged me.


Yet another season has passed without the need for intervention by the Judiciary Committee. This is a direct result of continued good management and governance. Congratulations to all members.

To continue to grow, donations are still the key. This year we had \$29,318 in donations and the Fund is progressing towards the target of \$500,000.


We're hoping to transfer up to \$10,000 to the Club early this financial year to assist with member development.

BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

The main focus of the Building Committee (BC) is to ensure the continued operation of the Club's main asset, The Clubhouse.

The Club was very fortunate that Neil Hallagan, a retired Civil Engineer stepped forward to accept a newly created volunteer position of Asset Maintenance Coordinator. This position was formed to address the issues raised in the Structural Engineering report of 3 February 2019, voluntarily written by BC member Brian Wooldridge and the subsequent recommendations made to the Club Board by the BC report of 13 April 2019.

The Clubhouse has a number of inherent issues brought on by its location close to the sea water, partial use as a commercial dining facility and its prime purpose as a lifesaving facility (Administration Offices, Equipment storage and overnight accommodation).

In implementing the BC report, the Club this year completed:

- 1. The repair of the galvanised framing under the Club entrance. This work involved replacing the rusting frame with timber, waterproofing the area, and retiling the floor in the Designated Outdoor Smoking Area.
- **2.** The Installation of an exhaust fan to lower the heat and humidity in the plant room.
- **3.** The cleaning of drains around eastern and northern building alignment to reduce water ingress into building walls and subsequent mould build up.
- **4.** A Council Grant awarded to a local builder to redesign and lower the drainage around the building and out through the ski shed to the beach, including concreting of ski room floor.
- **5.** A monitoring program of the building to measure any change in past cracking and ensure water drainage from the building remains unabated.
- **6.** A complete refurbishment of the clothing store to allow our wonderful \volunteers to operate a little easier.

Of serious concern for the Club was the discovery of Concrete cancer in the Entrance Bridge. Brian Wooldridge was again of great help, in this case, by drawing up the remedy plan. Neil oversaw the repair which included the use of zinc coating and high strength epoxy. This is expected to extend the life of the bridge by 5-10 years.

Also, as is the scourge of most older buildings near the sea, during a severe storm, water entered the ceiling through the roof. Insurance covered the water damage to the carpet and a contract has been completed to replace the damaged roof.

The Clubhouse is a building which requires continual maintenance and upkeep to ensure it continues to meet its various purposes in serving a growing club.

The Club is very grateful to Neil Hallagan who has been very generous with his valuable time, expertise and experience. The BC recommendations to the Club Board were very important to implement to ensure the longevity of the Clubhouse and the continued prosperity of the Club.

FUND RAISING & GRANTS REPORT

It was a bumper year for the Club this year on all fronts as the team built on last year's hard work to really start to put some runs on the board. It was a fantastic, consistent effort by all which provided much needed funds.



SOS Collectors

The year's fundraising kicked off with a bang when the club came together to "shake the tin" as part of our annual SOS appeal. We had one of our biggest appeals to date, led by Kerry Barlow, netting over \$20,000!! The fantastic contribution from Gary Jones supported by Kay Blokkeerus continued with solid numbers again through the Art Union raffle and chocolate sales. In the uniform shop and nipper canteen led by Julie-Anne Richards and Matt Lee (respectively) it was all hands to the pump with the huge number of nippers this year. Due to their hard work,

and those that lent a hand each week, we had another great contribution from these essential club outlets. As always, Mets on Kings were massive supporters of the club and their continued efforts in raising funds throughout the year through raffles and the Envirobank bottle collection was greatly appreciated.

In the Grants space we had a HUGE year which started with \$50,000 (over two years) from Stockland Aura. The Gambling Benefit Fund provide another \$35,000, and between the Federal Government and Sunshine Coast Council we were successful in raising an additional \$24,000. All told we obtained over \$100,000 in grants this year which was used, in most part, on new equipment and larger infrastructure projects like a new shed to house equipment and essential maintenance of the Senior Club house. There are several Grants still in play that we are hopeful of winning over the coming months.



Whilst the Fundraising and Grant success was brilliant I am most proud of the Sponsorship result. This year Angela Bradby rewrote the sponsorship prospectus and used her own team to give it some WOW. Armed with our new prospectus and some new ideas we went to market and were able to secure some fantastic (and hopefully ongoing) new sponsors. We were also thankful to welcome back some previous sponsors who continue to support the club. All told, we raised \$35,000 for the year which, from a standing start, was a huge effort and symbolic of the overwhelming generosity of our sponsors. 


Candice Care Tent Up At Nippers








Beach Attendance

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General Information

The financial statements cover Metropolitan Caloundra Surf Life Saving Club Inc ("the club") as an individual entity.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*. The club is a not-for-profit entity for financial report purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements, except the cash flow information, have been prepared on accrual basis and are based on historical costs, modified where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest Australian dollar.

The financial statements were authorised for issue on 27 July 2020 by the Board of Management.

Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to confirm changes in presentation for the current financial year.

New Accounting Standards 2020

The adoption of AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers and AASB 1058 Income for Not for Profit Entities has not had a material impact on the Club for the 2020 financial year.

The adoption of AASB 16 Leases in the 2020 financial year has not had an impact on the Club.

(a) Income Tax

The Australian Charities and Not-for-profit Commission have endorsed the association as a charitable institution.

No provision for income tax has been raised as the association is exempt from income tax under Section 50-5 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

(b) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short-term borrowings in current liabilities on the Statement of Financial Position.

(c) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis or fair value as indicated less where applicable, less depreciation and impairment losses.

Property, plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount and impairment losses are recognised either in profit or loss or as a revaluation decrease if the impairment losses relate to a revalued asset. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present (refer to Note 1(f) for details of impairment).

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the club and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are recognised as expenses in profit or loss in the financial period in which they are incurred.

Plant and equipment that have been contributed at no cost or for nominal cost are recognised at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including capitalised leased assets, is depreciated on a diminishing value basis over their estimated useful lives to the club commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposal are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are included in the statement of profit and loss and other comprehensive income.

(d) Leases

Accounting Policy for Leases – 2020 Financial Year

For any new contracts entered into on or after 1 May 2019, the Club considers whether a contract is, or contains a lease. A lease is defined as 'a contract, or part of a contract, that conveys the right to use an asset (the underlying asset) for a period of time in exchange for consideration'.

To apply this definition the Club assesses whether the contract meets three key evaluations which are whether:

- the contract contains an identified asset, which is either explicitly identified in the contract or implicitly specified by being identified at the time the asset is made available to the Club;
- the Club has the right to obtain substantially all of the economic benefits from use of the identified asset throughout the period of use, considering its rights within the defined scope of the contract;
- the Club has the right to direct the use of the identified asset throughout the period of use. The Club assess whether it has the right to direct 'how and for what purpose' the asset is used throughout the period of use.

Measurement and recognition of leases as a lessee

At lease commencement date, the Club recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability on the balance sheet. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which is made up of the initial measurement of the lease liability, any initial direct costs incurred by the

Club, an estimate of any costs to dismantle and remove the asset at the end of the lease, and any lease payments made in advance of the lease commencement date (net of any incentives received).

The Club depreciates the right-of-use assets on a straight-line basis from the lease commencement date to the earlier of the end of the useful life of the right-of-use asset or the end of the lease term. The Club also assesses the right-of-use asset for impairment when such indicators exist. At the commencement date, the Club measures the lease liability at the present value of the lease payments unpaid at that date, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease if that rate is readily available or the Club's incremental borrowing rate.

Lease payments included in the measurement of the lease liability are made up of fixed payments (including in substance fixed), variable payments based on an index or rate, amounts expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee and payments arising from options reasonably certain to be exercised.

Subsequent to initial measurement, the liability will be reduced for payments made and increased for interest. It is remeasured to reflect any reassessment or modification, or if there are changes in in-substance fixed payments. When the lease liability is remeasured, the corresponding adjustment is reflected in the right-of-use asset, or profit and loss if the right-of-use asset is already reduced to zero.

Measurement and recognition of leases as a lessee

The Club has elected to account for short-term leases and leases of low-value assets using the practical expedients. Instead of recognising a right-of-use asset and lease liability, the payments in relation to these are recognised as an expense in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the lease term. On the statement of financial position, right-of-use assets have been included in property, plant and equipment and lease liabilities have been included in trade and other payables.

The Club as a lessor

The Club's accounting policy under AASB 16 has not changed from the comparative period. As a lessor the Club classifies its leases as either operating or finance leases. A lease is classified as a finance lease if it transfers substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership of the underlying asset, and classified as an operating lease if it does not.

Accounting Policy for Leases – 2019 Financial Year

Leases of property, plant and equipment, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset but not the legal ownership are transferred to the entity, are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised, recognising an asset and a liability equal to the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives where it is likely that the entity will obtain ownership of the asset. Lease payments are

allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period.

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are recognised as expenses on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Lease incentives under operating leases are recognised as a liability and amortised on a straight-line basis over the life of the lease term.

(e) Financial Instruments

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument, and are measured initially at fair value adjusted by transactions costs, except for those carried at fair value through profit or loss, which are measured initially at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities are described below.

Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or when the financial asset and all substantial risks and rewards are transferred. A financial liability is derecognised when it is extinguished, discharged, cancelled or expires.

Classification and Subsequent Measurement of Financial Assets

Except for those trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component and are measured at the transaction price, all financial assets are initially measured at fair value adjusted for transaction costs (where applicable).

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets other than those designated and effective as hedging instruments are classified into the following categories upon initial recognition:

- amortised cost
- fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)
- equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)

Financial assets at amortised cost

Financial assets are measured at amortised cost if the assets meet the following conditions (and are not designated as FVPL):

- They are held within a business model whose objective is to hold the financial assets and collect its contractual cash flows.
- The contractual terms of the financial assets give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is immaterial.

Financial assets at amortised cost (continued)

The club's cash and cash equivalents, trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments as well as long-term deposit that were previously classified as held-to-maturity under AASB 139.

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)

Financial assets that are held within a different business model other than 'hold to collect' or 'hold to collect and sell' are categorised at fair value through profit and loss. Further, irrespective of business model financial assets whose contractual cash flows are not solely payments of principal and interest are accounted for at FVPL. All derivative financial instruments fall into this category, except for those designated and effective as hedging instruments, for which the hedge accounting requirements apply (see below).

Equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (Equity FVOCI)

Investments in equity instruments that are not held for trading are eligible for an irrevocable election at inception to be measured at FVOCI. Under Equity FVOCI, subsequent movements in fair value are recognised in other comprehensive income and are never reclassified to profit or loss. Dividends from these investments continue to be recorded as other income within the profit or loss unless the dividend clearly represents return of capital. This category includes unlisted equity securities - XY ltd that were previously classified as 'available-for-sale' under AASB 139.

Impairment of Financial assets

AASB 9's impairment requirements use more forward looking information to recognize expected credit losses - the 'expected credit losses (ECL) model'. Instruments within the scope of the new requirements included loans and other debt-type financial assets measured at amortised cost and FVOCI, trade receivables and loan commitments and some financial guarantee contracts (for the issuer) that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss.

Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables include amounts due from customers for goods sold and services performed in the ordinary course of business. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Trade and other receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any provision for impairment. Refer to Note 1(j) for further discussion on the determination of impairment losses.

Classification and measurement of financial liabilities

As the accounting for financial liabilities remains largely unchanged from AASB 139, the club's financial liabilities were not impacted by the adoption of AASB 9. However, for completeness, the accounting policy is disclosed below.

The club's financial liabilities include borrowings and trade and other payables. Financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value, and, where applicable, adjusted for transaction costs unless the club designated a financial liability at fair value through profit or loss.

Subsequently, financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method except for derivatives and financial liabilities designated at FVPL, which are carried subsequently at fair value with gains or losses recognised in profit or loss

Derecognition

Financial assets are derecognised where the contractual rights to receipt of cash flows expires or the asset is transferred to another party whereby the entity is no longer have any significant continuing involvement in the risks and benefits associated with the asset. Financial liabilities are derecognised where the related obligations are either discharged, cancelled or expire. The difference between the carrying value of the financial liability extinguished or transferred to another party and the fair value of consideration paid, including the transfer of non-cash assets or liabilities assumed is recognised in the profit or loss.

(f) Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the club reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less cost to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the assets carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the statement of comprehensive income.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the club estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

(g) Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the club's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may not satisfy vesting requirements.

Those cash outflows are discounted using market yields on corporate bonds with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cash flows attributable to employee benefits. Contributions are made by the club to employee superannuation funds and are charged as expenses when incurred.

(h) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the club has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(i) Revenue

Non-reciprocal grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the club obtains control of the grant, it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the club and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before it is eligible to receive the contribution, the recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

When grant revenue is received whereby the club incurs an obligation to deliver economic value directly back to the contributor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction and the grant revenue is recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until the service has been delivered to the contributor, otherwise the grant is recognised as income on receipt.

The club received non-reciprocal subsidies from the government. The subsidies are recognised as income on receipt.

Revenue from sale of goods comprises revenue earned from sale of goods donated and resale. Sales revenue is recognised when the control of goods passes to the customer.

Rental income is accounted for on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Donations collected, including cash and goods for resale, are recognised as revenue when the group gains control, economic benefits are probable and the amount of the donation can be measured reliably.

Interest revenue is recognised on accrual basis using the effective interest method. . All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST) where applicable.

(j) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities, which are recoverable from or payable to the ATO, are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

(k) Trade and Other Receivables

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from customers for goods sold in the ordinary course of business. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Accounts receivable are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

(I) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated costs of completion and selling expenses.

(m) Trade and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the club during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(n) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The Board of Management evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the club.

Key Estimates – Impairment

The Board of Management assess impairment at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the club that may lead to the impairment of assets. Where an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. Value-inuse calculations performed in assessing recoverable amounts incorporate a number of key estimates.

No impairment has been recognised in respect of the current year.

(o) Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities

The club measures some of its assets and liabilities at fair value on either a recurring or nonrecurring basis, depending on the requirements of the applicable Accounting Standard.

Fair value is the price the club would receive to sell an asset or would have to pay to transfer a liability in an orderly (i.e. unforced) transaction between independent, knowledgeable and willing market participants at the measurement date.

As fair value is a market-based measure, the closest equivalent observable market pricing information is used to determine fair value. Adjustments to market values may be made having regard to the characteristics of the specific asset or liability. The fair values of assets and liabilities that are not traded in an active market are determined using one or more valuation techniques. These valuation techniques maximise, to the extent possible, the use of observable market data.

(p)Economic Dependence

The Club is dependent upon the ongoing receipt of donations and rental income from Metropolitan Caloundra Surf Life Saving Supporters Club to ensure the ongoing continuance of its operations. At the date of this report, the Board of Management has no reason to believe that this financial support will not continue.

The Board of Management of the Association are responsible for the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements and the *Australian Charities and Not for Profit Act 2012* and for such internal control as the Board of Management determine is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial report, the Board of Management are responsible for assessing the Association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Board of Management either intend to liquidated the Association or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Report

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial report as a whole is free from misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of this financial report.

As part of an audit in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, internal omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain and understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Association's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the Board of Management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the Board of Management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Association's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial report or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Association to cease to continue as a going concern.

Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Report (Continued)

 Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial report, including the disclosures, and whether the financial report represents the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with the Board of Management regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during the audit.

Other fundraising

Container Collection Scheme, \$2 Tap and Go, Entertainment Book sales and promotion, Foundation Lottery Ticket Sales.
