PRESIDENTS REPORT

How best to describe Mets' Season 2023-24? Words like Stability, Spirit, Growth, Vigilance, and Celebration come to mind.

2023-24 represented a significant milestone in our Club history. 7th October 2023 marked 90 years since the first volunteer patrol of Kings Beach. In 1933 it was Cliff Croughan, Doug Mabin, and Bill Porter who made up the first volunteer patrol... fast forward 90 years, it was the Sand Crabs and Des Dwyer patrol teams keeping Kings Beach safe. The highlight of our celebrations was the 90th Anniversary Gala Ball in October 2023. The Club Gala Ball was a great success where the Club shone brightly celebrating our past, present, and future. The production of a feature video as a legacy initiative and to support 90th celebrations was such a positive experience in reconnecting with the Old Boys and families who shaped the Club in its more formative times. Thank you to the 90th organizing committee who did an amazing job (Justine Ashworth, Stuart Cordingley, Jacob Thomson, Sharon Punter, and Eliza Dreves).

Total Club membership for the season was 845 Members including 191 Active Members, 316 Junior Activities Members, and 289 Associate Members. Thank you all for your membership, service, and support throughout a very successful season for the Club.

Most pleasing this season has been our Members' shared commitment to the Mets One-Club family.

We should all be very proud of our Club and its achievements this season, the highlights of which are outlined below.

Our Operations Group

All areas of the Club have again been well managed this season, which is only possible through the commitment of our operational leaders. Thank you to our Club Captain, Andrew Richards, for his leadership of the Club's operations, which has again been a key component of the Club's success this season. Andrew was effective in each of his capacities, namely, Club Captain, coordination of the Operations Group, coordination of the Friday night raffles, liaison with SLSQ Sunshine Coast Branch and Council on lifesaving matters, and communication with the Board on operational issues.

Lifesaving: Thank you to Andrew, Deputy Club Captains, Shane Punter, Harry Richards, Carl Perkins and Cameron Ray, and our Patrol Captains and their respective teams for your service over the season. This season saw over 130,000 members of the public visit Kings Beach, which with increased visitation to Happy Valley, is now one of the busiest stretches of beach on the Sunshine Coast. This combined with challenging conditions on many weekends during the season led to 27 rescues and 139 first aid cases.

This season saw our own Simon Richards, Kirsten Phillips, and Eliza Dreves appointed to key roles with SLSQ and Sunshine Coast Branch. Simon as the State Life Saving Officer who chairs the State Life Saving Committee, and Kirsten as the State Membership Officer who chairs the State Membership Committee, with both reporting to the SLSQ Board. This is the first time that one Club has Members leading 2 x State Committees. Meanwhile, Kirsten is also the Sunshine Coast Branch Director of Youth and Membership, and Eliza is the Sunshine Coast Branch Deputy Director of Youth. We are very fortunate to have Members in these leadership roles given access to lifesaving knowledge and networks this provides to our Club.

Training and Education: Thank you to our Chief Training Officer, Aleisha Edwards, and our Trainers and Assessors who have again done a fantastic job. This is a function that is critical to the Club's sustainability in maintaining and growing our patrolling members' necessary awards and skills. This season saw 26 new SRC's and 27 new Bronzies receive their awards in addition to the huge task of skills maintenance and new awards for existing members.

Member Development: Thank you to our Member Development Officer, Eliza Dreves, and her team who have again achieved plenty this season. Engagement and development of our youth continues to be a Club success story which has seen retention of many of our nippers to now being senior active members. This has been possible through the team's energy in coordinating engagement activities through member recognition initiatives, events such as the Youth Ball, Camp Commando leadership camp, lifesaving training and education courses, and Club BBQ's, as well as contributing to Branch and or SLSQ programs such as PULSE Advanced Lifesaving.

If not busy enough, Eliza and her team also coordinate the Club's Annual Dinner and award nominations.

Junior Activities: Thank you to Junior Activities Chairperson, Mel Ray, the Junior Activities Committee, and legion of parent volunteers for a successful nipper season. Our nippers excelled in all areas including lifesaving, education, surf sports, and member development activities. It was great to see Mets again host the Junior Branch carnival at Kings Beach, which I look forward to being a regular feature of our annual Club calendar.

Our nipper program continues to underpin the Club's ability to enhance member retention rates and our pipeline of patrolling members.

Surf Sports: Thank you to Surf Sports Officer, Phill Ashworth, coaches, team managers, and volunteers for a successful season which culminated in the recent Aussies hosted on the Sunshine Coast. Phill's leadership has seen the Mets' surf sports program positively develop this season by bringing together disciplines and age groups as one-club, creating a governance framework through the production of a surf sports manual, building Club spirit through initiatives such as camps, participation at interstate carnivals, and the Mets Club Champs, and providing access to quality, professional coaching.

A thriving surf sports program is a key contributor to Mets' success as it builds Club spirit, profile, and our capability to save lives.

Congratulations to all athletes and the Surf Sports team for your results and Club representation at all carnivals, in all disciplines contested, across the season.

I look forward to following our team competing at the World Lifesaving Championships later this year on the Gold Coast.



Our Committees

Our standing committees are acknowledged for their contribution during the season. Of special note, thank you to Brent Hiley for his tireless work in leading our fundraising committee in securing Grant funding and sponsorships. Thank you to Beth and Shane Kunkel, supported by Emily Hiley, for leading our fundraising for the QLD Surf Appeal resulting in >\$35,000, a fantastic result!

Whilst on fundraising, a huge thank you to our patrolling members for driving the Friday night raffles, and our surf sports team for the Saturday afternoon raffles, a combined net outcome of >\$35,000, another excellent outcome.

The Building Committee was not formed and or convened as there was no requirement this season.

Our Life Members

Our Life Members' contribution over the season is acknowledged - we are fortunate to have so many Life Members active in the Club passing on their experience.

It is with sadness that we acknowledge the passing of Life Member, Norm Irvine, and Old Boys, Gordon King, Bryan Costigan, and Michael Ogle over the course of the season, and remember the contributions made to the Club. Condolences go out to the respective families.

Our Assets

Our Clubhouse, the Pavilion, and the Boatshed are Sunshine Coast Regional Council (Council) assets with community leases in favour of Mets. The Club has an agreement in place with the Caloundra State School for the Queen Street Storage Shed.

The Queen Street Storage Shed was improved this season through the connection of power (and solar), as well as the provision of gym equipment. Thank you to Jim Chisholm for leading the connection of power/solar, to Brent Hiley for securing Grant funding, and to Phill Ashworth and Molly for developing the shed into a training and craft storage facility.

Discussions with Council are ongoing to secure a long-term extension to the lease for the Pavilion.

Unfortunately, the Boatshed Redevelopment (aka the Kings Beach Lifesaving Facility (KBLF) project) was delayed this season due to the Council's Coastal Hazard Adaptation Strategy and its potential impacts on the proposed development. This has required significant redesign to address environmental and overland flow issues. Pleasingly, the Council remains committed to funding the project, however, a proposed construction start date is subject to resolving the design challenges.

Our Supporters' Club

Thank you to the Supporters' Club, Kings Beach Surf Club, Board for the positive working relationship with which Mets enjoys. The Supporters' Club provided significant financial support and support in-kind this season which has been critical to the sustainability of Mets. The Supporters' Club and Mets (Surf Life Saving (SLS) Club) Boards continue to work closely to strive to increase the level of support to the SLS Club to enable it to fulfil its core purpose.

All Mets Members are encouraged to frequent the Kings Beach Surf Club as every \$ spent ultimately supports our Club.

FINANCE REPORT

Congratulations to Club Captain Andrew Richards and the Patrol Captains and teams for a job very well done in patrolling our beach in challenging conditions. The continual changes to the bar and large crowds swimming South of the groyne increased the level of responsibility taken on by our Patrols. A big thank you to all Patrol members.

MEMBER FUNDRAISING (THIS IS THE SOUL OF OUR FINANCES)

The Patrol Raffles, Surf Sport Raffles and the Surf Appeal are great examples of the pride our members have for their club. It is not to be underestimated what this extra revenue allows us to do in providing Lifesaver training and Surf Sports coaching and equipment.

Patrol run Raffles on Friday Night raised \$26,131

A huge thank you to the Patrols for doing the Friday night raffles at the Supporters Club. The competitiveness of the patrols contributed greatly to this result. The other factor was the improvement in trading by the Kings Beach Surf Club providing eager raffle participants. Thank you to the sponsors (again Kings Beach Surf Club and Pinnell's Butchery being the major ones).

Surf Sport Raffles in 7 months raised \$13,252

Thank you again to all Surf Sports participants who sold tickets and organised this raffle. The Supporters Club will continue to run the raffles through the off season. Thank you to the Kings Beach Surf Club.



Surf Appeal A total which has bounced around a little due to funds coming in from various sources now sits at \$36,919. A GREAT EFFORT BY ALL, this helps our overall budget which was estimated at \$25,000.

A special thank you to Beth and Shane Kunkel with guidance from Emily Hiley persevered through poor weather to obtain an outstanding result. Congratulations to the members and the Kunkel's for financially kickstarting the 23/24 season.



GRANTS, SPONSORS AND GOVERNMENT SUBSIDY

Brent Hiley continued to do a brilliant job applying for and obtaining Sponsorship and Grants. Unfortunately, Brent is stepping down next year, so we will need to find replacements for him. Thank you Brent, I believe we will need more than one person to follow in your footsteps.

Sponsors: Major Sponsors were, Mclean Henzell, boards and Hi Viz Singlets \$8,480, Henzell's \$5000 for 90th Anniversary, Seafood Market \$2,000, Viden \$2000, Notre Dame College \$5,000 and Pacific Silica \$5,000. Thank you to all these very generous sponsors.

Government Subsidy: We received a major boost in Subsidy from the State Government. Total Subsidy was \$58,453. These extra funds have increased our reserves and offset increases in our insurance and admin expenses.

Grants: Grants totalled \$28,000 including SCRC \$7,500, Coke \$5,000, Surf Lifesaving Australia \$10,000, SLSQ \$3000 and Sport and Rec \$2,500.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURE

We have spent \$99,261 in the 2023/24 Financial Year on purchase of capital items. The big ones were:

- Surf Boat \$28,727
- JAC boards \$16,686
- IRB motor \$5,300
- Patrol and training equipment \$8,196
- Masters boards \$3,000
- Solar and electricity to Queen Street shed \$17,608
- Other building \$6,887
- Office fit out/furniture and plant \$4,476
- Signs and painting 75% donated by the Supporters \$8,381.

Only the office fit out, furniture, and plant totalling \$11,363 were not funded by Grants, Donations, or Sponsors.

Queen Street Shed, Grant Funded and Member Managed and Developed: Thank you to Jim Chisholm whose project management skills overcame some significant problems in connection of power. Phill Ashworth, Brent Hiley (Grants) and Molly each had significant input into developing this facility into a very useful asset to assist Surf Sports training and storage. Thank you, guys, for reinforcing the feeling of pride in our club.



FINANCIAL RESERVES

Rent from the Supporters Club was the main source of our growth in reserves.

We have added \$144,968 in Building Reserves and Debt reduction. Building Reserves is vital to us maintaining our capital assets.

The Foundation grew by \$36,387 to a total of \$465,481. See full report on Foundation.

USE OF FUNDS BY METS ON TRAINING, PATROLLING, COMPETING AND EVENTS

90th Anniversary Dinner: This was an exceptional event from so many perspectives. The organisation cannot be faulted. The event ran smoothly and reports are glowing about member experiences. Total expenses were \$40,300. Total Income was \$40,029 including sponsorship of \$6,500, and raffle profit of \$5,948. A great event was also a success financially. Congratulations to Justine Ashworth, Stuart Cordingley, Jacob Thomson and the organising committee.

JAC: The JAC under the leadership of Mel Ray had another successful year with high levels of membership and a full range of activities. The JAC were very active in fundraising. This included the Surf Appeal and raffles at the Supporters Club. Another increase in revenue was from board leases which were administered and paid for.

Training: Congratulations to Aleisha Edwards for facilitating a full training program for our members.

Aleisha was supported by many other trainers. The training was delivered at a very acceptable cost. Without trainers the club would not be able to function. A very big thank you to all involved in training.

Member Development: was again co-ordinated by Eliza Dreves. Met's Foundation continues to fund member development. Our investment in our young members is showing some returns through leadership shown on patrol, in competition and in social events co-ordinated by our young members. Congratulations to Eliza for doing such a great job in this area.

Surf Sports: Phill Ashworth put in an enormous number of hours to design a Surf Sports Program for 2023/24. The comprehensive program was \$30,000 over our normal Surf Sports budget which was funded by a generous sponsorship by the Kings Beach Surf Club (Supporters Club).

The Surf Sports program saw an increase in participation by a cross section of club members including the masters and a revival of the Club Championships.

A strong Surf Sports program provides the opportunity to all members to improve their fitness and surf skills. This enhances the Clubs ability to keep the beach safe for our Community.

KINGS BEACH SURF CLUB (SUPPORTERS CLUB)

Thank you to the Supporters Club which remains our major source of funding. They were able to maintain their rental payments of \$21,000 per month and increase support of the SLSC by:

\$30,000 donation for Surf Sports, cleaning of the clubhouse, support to patrols through refreshments, assisting with running of raffles, donation for costs associated with 90th Anniversary, Annual Dinner, JAC events, Club Championships, Surf Sports presentation, and several other meetings.

Thank you to the Kings Beach Surf Club board and staff for all their support.

GENERAL

Thank you to all who assisted to raise funds and more importantly those who showed restraint in spending. This measured approach to financial management has kept our Club in a strong financial position. We will need to be very vigilant to ensure this strong financial position is maintained into the future.

Thank you to Kay Blokkeerus and Kate Coles for their support in administering income and expenses of the club. There is a lot of paperwork required to run a club. Thank you, Kay and Kate.

Thank you to Brett Magnussen our President for his consistent leadership. Thank you to the SLSC Board for their support and management of our Club.

FOUNDATION REPORT

The Foundation commenced 1 May 2023 with assets of \$429,094. This was made up of:

Bank Account	\$54,494
Loan to SLSC	\$284,600
Term Deposit	\$90,000

Funds in totalled \$95,973

This left the Foundation bank account with \$69,881 at 30 April 2024

CLOSING VALUE OF FOUNDATION 30 April 2024 is \$465,480

Note that the Foundation has grown by \$36,386 in the 2023/24 financial year.

\$21,600 was due to Reserve Transfer from the SLSC

\$14,786 was from interest and donations being in excess of member development costs.

FUTURE DIRECTION OF FOUNDATION

The foundation is more than meeting its primary purpose of funding Mets Youth Development.

Interest and Donations exceeded Youth Development costs by \$14,786.

In the future it is expected that Interest will be at least 4% average of funds invested \$465,480 = \$18,619 and donations

Above \$5,000 = total income of above \$23,619. This is well above current Youth Development costs.

On the other hand, we have we have major building projects occurring in the near future and I believe we need to build up our Building Reserves.

I propose that we suspend contributions from the SLSC to the Foundation for the next 12 months commencing May 2024. These funds be transferred to building reserves. This decision could be reviewed annually.



GRANTS, SPONSORSHIP & FUNDRAISING

It was a bumper year for the Club this year on all fronts as the team built on last year's hard work. It was a fantastic, consistent effort by all which provided much needed funds as the club continues to grow and expand its community offerings.

The years fundraising kicked off with a bang when the club came together to "shake the tin" as part of our annual QLD Lifesavers Appeal. This year the appeal was led by the fantastic Kunkel Family supported by friends and fellow Nipper Family's as well as patrolling members across Brisbane and the coast. It was their first year "on the tools" and they did a brilliant job raising over \$36,000 in much needed funds.

In the uniform shop led by Mel and David Ray, and nipper canteen led by the Matt Lee, Gary "Jonesy" Jones and Shannyn & Nick Taylor, it was all hands to the pump with the huge number of nippers this year. Due to their hard work, and those that leant a hand each week, we had another great financial contribution from these essential club outlets.

Pleasingly, the weekly raffles have become a much-loved fixture at the Supporters Club. In total this year the club received over \$96,000 in Grant funding. It has been my pleasure to once again serve as Club Captain for the 2023/2024 Season. This report only touches on a few of the highlights of the day-to-day operations of the club, and the countless emails from members, branch and state that seem to hit my inbox each week. Thank you to Brett and the Board for your support for myself and the Operations Group through the season. I can assure all members that the club is in good hands with the strategic leadership of the board.

Club Captains Conference

Prior to the start of the season, Surf Life Saving Queensland held a conference for Club Captains and Chief Training Officers. They welcomed Club Captains and Chief Training Officers from every club in Queensland, as well as SLSQ Staff and state officers, to come to the Gold Coast for a weekend of Learning and Development. This was an excellent opportunity to connect with club captains from across the state and discover the common challenges that every club faces when patrolling our beaches and training our members.

One highlight of the conference was having two life members of the Club also participate in the conference. With Simon Richards and Kirsten Phillips in senior leadership roles leading two of the four state committees, it once again shows that Mets is one of those clubs that is always punching above its weight.

Patrols

Well done and thank you to all active members who patrolled Kings Beach this year; and the families and others who supported our active Bronze and SRC members in keeping Kings Beach a safe place to swim. With over 130,000 beach visitations, it was certainly a busy season with some interesting surf conditions throughout the season. Fortunately, with the closing over of the Caloundra Bar and implementation of Lifeguard services at Happy Valley, we were able to concentrate our patrol efforts on Kings Beach.

There are details of Patrol Hours elsewhere in this report, but quite a few members this season went above and beyond their normal patrol obligations and completed some extraordinary hours on the beach - well done and thank you.

This season the club recorded 27 rescues, 18 Major First Aid cases, 139 Minor First Aid cases and 3762 Preventative Actions. These numbers are slightly down on last season and could be a result of better weather conditions and more pro-active actions taken by our patrol teams. A more detailed breakdown of Patrol Statistics is available in this report.

Operations Group

Thank you to all members of the Operations Group for your efforts throughout the season. Individual members of the Operations Group Committee will detail their activities within this report, but I want to acknowledge the exceptional way that the committee worked together to achieve the operational goals and objectives of the club. In my second season as Club Captain, and with a nearly unchanged operational group, I believe we refined our roles and processes and worked more efficiently than last season. I really appreciated the support, advice and knowledge they provided. I will not be taking on the Club Captain role next season, but with many of the members of the Operations Group continuing in leadership roles I know that the club is in good hands for many seasons to come. I have already advised the Operations Group and Board that I am happy to provide a support and guidance role to next seasons Club Captain.

Patrol Captains

The Operations Group has many important members, but the most crucial ones are the committed operational leaders who come every weekend and oversee the patrols on our beach - our Patrol Captains and Vice Captains. As a club, we are lucky to have such a skilled and experienced group of members who take on this essential role. Thank you to each one of you for your time and devotion. Our Patrols would not work without your efforts.

Also thank you to the office admin staff for their assistance throughout the season.

Challenges and Opportunities

As we think about the previous season, we can also use this chance to look ahead, and how to best prepare ourselves to face new challenges and embrace opportunities.

Last season there was constant feedback regards the Patrol Roster, and the perceived inequality in some of the team rostering. A lot of time and effort was spent prior to this season to adjust the roster to ensure there was an equitable allocation of patrol days, morning and afternoon patrols, and Public Holidays. Feedback on the changes for this season has been extremely positive and we have already developed a similar roster for next season. The incoming Captain and Operations Group may have to examine the composition of Patrol teams to make sure each team has enough members and necessary skills.

One of the challenges we encountered this season was the access to radio equipment and repairs. Communication is vital in any emergency service operation, and this year I recognise that our club radios were at times lacking due to the difficulty of obtaining replacement batteries and chargers. When these replacements did arrive, we discovered that we still had battery problems that eventually damaged several of our radios. This will not be a problem next season as the Queensland Government and SLSQ will switch patrols to the Government Wireless Network (GWN) radio system. This will involve SLSQ funding, providing and maintaining a completely new radio system – and yes, it has been confirmed that this will take place next season.

One of the key aspects of any volunteer organisation is to provide ongoing development for our members and prepare them for our leadership roles. In the next season, the club's priority is to make sure we have members who are learning to be patrol leaders, and who are also familiar with the club's committees so they can take on committee roles. I think Mets has some of the best members in the organisation and I'm keen to assist the Board and Operations Group to create plans to offer development opportunities for all of our members.

Once again, I would like to thank every member of the club for their efforts over the season. It is the members who make Mets great! See you all on the beach next season.

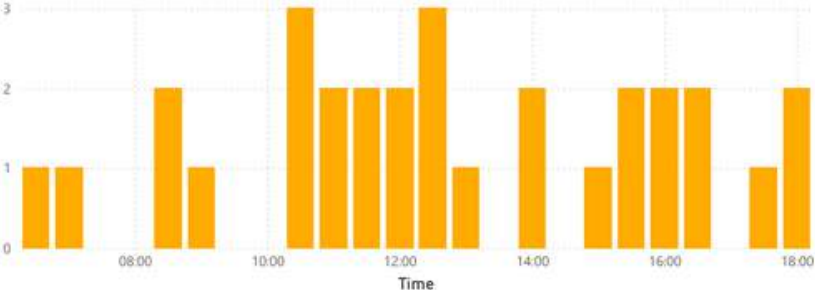

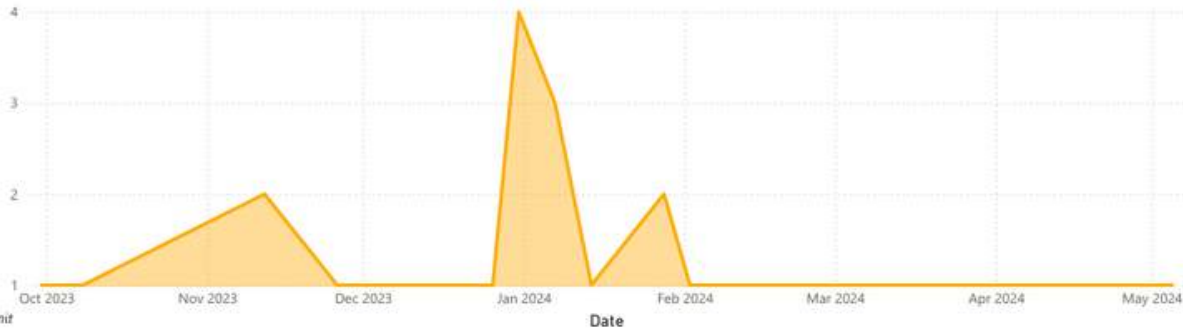
Incidents by Type

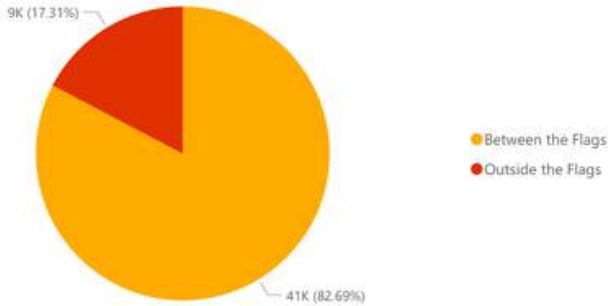

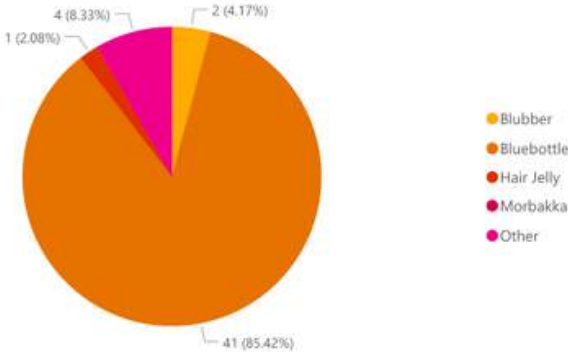

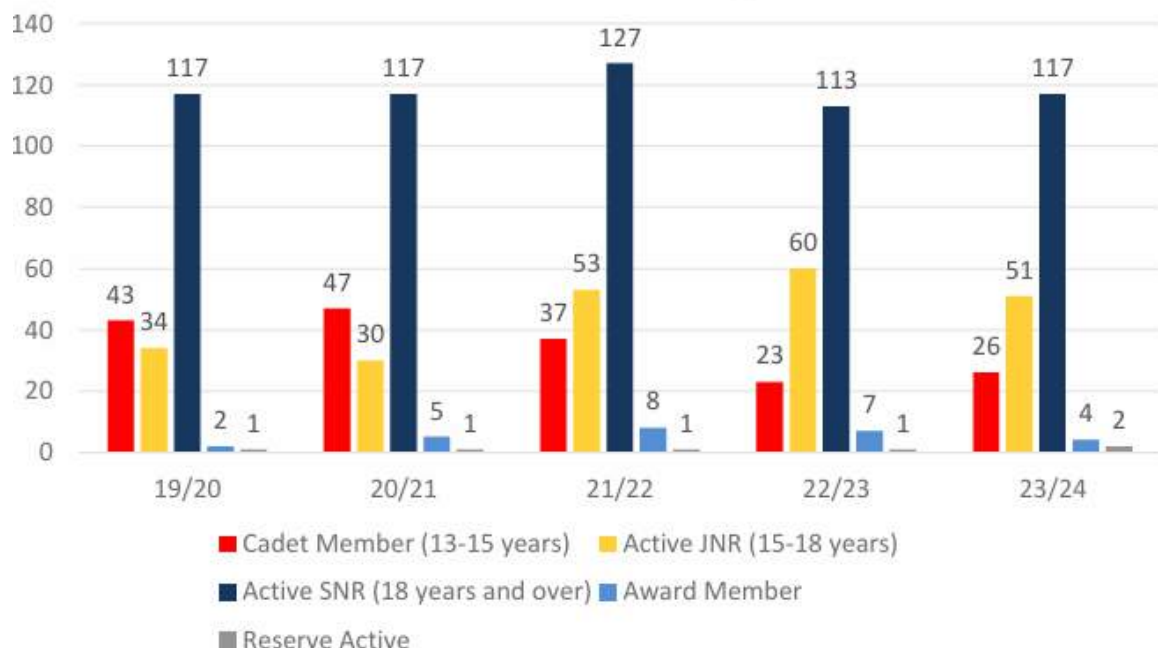

Thank you also to each and every patrol team who welcomed new members to their patrols. The training that we deliver in the classroom and during a course is only a fraction of what new members can learn from the experienced members of their new patrols.

I am extremely pleased to report that we were able to see a return of a 'live in' SRC and Bronze camp during the September school holidays this season. I believe that the teenage candidates who completed the course will benefit greatly from training together and building those bonds and friendships which hopefully see them through many years of volunteering with their club and their friends. SURF SPORTS

Surf Sports at Metropolitan Caloundra Surf Life Saving Club has always been a corner stone of the club's existence.

I have often thought about some of the surf sports athletes of the yester year and the thing that I often reflect on is the fact that we have had some seriously talented individuals and teams representing our club at all levels. This season has proven to be no different, again we have had some fantastic performances and contributions from many of our members.

Going back about two years ago I started to really give some serious thought to what surf sports means to Metropolitan Caloundra SLSC. What it means to the "CLUB". We know surf sports at surf clubs create pathways for individuals, pathways that individuals can use to positively develop themselves in multiple areas, however from a "CLUB" point of view what does surf sports really mean. To me the following statement best describes the purpose of Surf Sports here at Metropolitan Caloundra SLSC. The statement defines what the club wants and why.

The "VISION" of Surf Sports (We Seek):

- To have a sustainable surf sports program that provides members of all ages and in all disciplines the opportunity to develop their skills and health to better facilitate our lifesaving services between the red and yellow flags.
- To have a sustainable surf sports program that supports the club and the community in developing and doing is part in creating EXCEPTIONAL YOUNG ADULTS. Young adults that are Competent, Disciplined, Resilient, Compassionate and Positive contributors to our community.

- To have a national profile of "The club that consistently punches well above it's weight".

The above statement was put together at the start of the season, the statement laid the pathway for the surf sports program of 2023/2024 and what a pathway it was. It proved to be action packed with a little something for everyone. The season did not disappoint, we had some remarkable achievements and results. A few of the highlights and by no means all of them are listed below:

- A Pool Rescue season that surpassed all expectations, a season that included a trip to Cairns for the State Pool Rescue Championships. The club performed exceptionally throughout the season in all age groups, special mentioned to our Nippers and Masters.
- Season launch and information session held at the supporter's club in early September. Was a great way to communicate the upcoming season, the event was attended by upwards of 75 members.
- September Surf Sports Camp, which included 38 of our members, covering age groups from U11 to U19s. Focus of the camp was about engaging members of all ages, bringing them together as a team, building relationships and comradery through the varying disciplines of surf sports.

- Formation of our youngest ever female U19 Junior Boat Crew, who competed at multiple carnivals throughout the season. The crew went from strength to strength, facing the challenges of surf boat rowing head on.
- Introduction of CLUB SURF-GYM-ERGO TRAINING Sessions, held on Tuesday and Thursday mornings at the Club Shed/Gym. Sessions started mid-September and went all the way through to Aussies. Sessions included interval running, ergo training, stretching, core/abdominal work and strength/conditioning.
- In January, we had 23 of our U14+ members participate in a 4-day intensive Surf Sports Camp at Rainbow Beach. The camp was an opportunity to improve skills, fitness and start to prepare athletes for the business end of the season. This year's camp saw the inclusion of our Junior Girls Boat Crew, which was great to see.
- January also included the running of our U10 to U13 Surf Sports Camp at Kings Beach. The camp was an opportunity for our younger kids to further develop their skills and fitness in preparation for Branch and State Titles. The camp engaged 50 of our most junior members of the club, participants were enthusiastic and super engaged.



- Late January we had 12 of our U14+ members head to Sydney for our annual Manly/Freshwater tour. The tour was about building camaraderie among the youth team and preparing athletes for the business end of the season. The tour gave athletes the opportunity to race many of the best athletes in the country, at 2 of the most competitive carnivals of the season. The tour was also about providing our members with the opportunity to travel as part of a high-performance team, training and competing at venues that they would find unfamiliar, training and competing at venues that have unprecedented history in Australian Surf Life Saving. The touring party stayed at the Sydney Academy of Sport and Recreation Centre in Narrabeen, the participants did multiple training sessions on North Narrabeen and Collaroy beaches.

- End of March saw our annual Club Championships, run in some very trying conditions. We had 43 members participate with at least 12 other members in support roles, e.g. food preparation for a BBQ, officials, and water safety. It was a great day for the club and will go down as one of this season's highlights.

Season of 2023/2024 also brought about some fantastic achievements in the realm of competition. Some and only some are listed below.

MEMBER DEVELOPMENT

The 2023/24 season saw a great number of our members take the many opportunities Surf Lifesaving offers to develop their on and off the beach skills.

The members of our wonderful club have once again taken their continued development as Lifesavers in their stride; with over 20% of our patrolling members attending one development program or another. I can confidently say Mets would currently be considered a leading club in the area of attendance at development programs offered in the state – something to be proud of.

As always, a highlight of the year for our younger members was the 12th annual Camp Commando. For probably the fourth or even fifth year running, we once again had one of the largest number of members involved in this camp of any club on the coast.

The program was this year held at Yandina's Maranatha Recreation Centre, where all involved spent three days developing their teamwork, leadership and decision-making skills; as well as building on their network of Lifesaving friends. In addition to a high number of participants, Mets carried a big share of the leaders required to make the camp possible. Harry Richards, Audrey Dearling, Scott Hiley and Sienna O'Shea all stepped up as leaders for the program; and brought home many of their own new skills. Our Youth Development Officer, William Ashworth also joined myself on the coordination team and put in many hours behind the scenes from his home base of Canberra developing the program; and then flying up to deliver it. Mets members Kirsten Phillips, Christopher Keller, Kaitlin Dobinson, Michelle Peters, Alex Dreves and Brian Dreves also assisted with the program in a logistics capacity.

Mets yet again played host to the well-loved, PULSE Advanced Lifesaving Program this year. Members, Marg McGrath and Paul Vink participated in the three-day program in March and both had glowing reports. The program aims to develop the hands-on Lifesaving skills of our frontline Lifesavers; with a particular focus on responding to multi-casualty critical incidents. Life Member, Kirsten Phillips was again integral to the running of this program; and a number of our other members including Club Captain Andrew Richards and Vice Club Captain Cameron Ray were involved in the program as speakers and logistics officers. Another highlight for the season was several cadet members attending the Junior PULSE program. The day long program provided our newest patrol members a masterclass of patrolling skills.

We were also fortunate enough to secure spots for members on many other programs throughout the season, including the Leadership Excellence Program (LEP), the Magnet Island Lifesaving Development Programs (LDP) and the brand new Advanced Development Program (ALDP). The Youth Ball was well attended again; with around 30 members, joining the almost 300 strong crowd to celebrate a season well done. Seeing our members return from these programs with not only a whole raft of new skills, but also a renewed sense of passion for Surf Lifesaving is motivation enough to ensure Mets continues to be actively engaged in as many of the development opportunities offered to our members as possible. I'd like to thank the Board for supporting the attendance of our members at all these development programs, through fee subsidy via the Metropolitan Caloundra Foundation.

While so many people have contributed to member development this year, I'd like to particularly thank William Ashworth, who despite living over a thousand kilometres away, has assisted wherever he could with the Youth Development Officer role. He has ensured maximum involvement from our members in the above-mentioned programs as well as organising a fun social event for our youth members that are outside the age brackets able to attend many camps.

In looking briefly at our patrolling statistics, it is impressive to see that close on 50% of our regularly patrolling members are aged below 21. While youth in the wider community are getting an increasingly bad wrap in 2024; I am buoyed constantly by the way our own youth members, and those of all surf clubs, are conducting themselves in areas of surf sports, training, personal and professional development as Lifesavers and of course the thousands upon thousands of combined voluntary service they give on the beach every year.

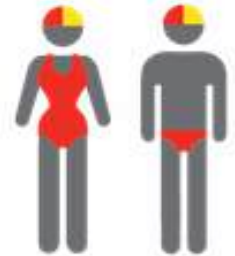

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General Information

The financial statements cover Metropolitan Caloundra Surf Life Saving Club Inc (“the club”) as an individual entity.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Simplified Disclosures of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*. The club is a not-for-profit entity for financial report purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements, except the cash flow information, have been prepared on accrual basis and are based on historical costs, modified where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest Australian dollar.

The financial statements were authorised for issue on 24th May 2024 by the Board of Management.

Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to confirm changes in presentation for the current financial year.

(a) Income Tax

The *Australian Charities and Not-for-profit Commission* have endorsed the association as a charitable institution.

No provision for income tax has been raised as the association is exempt from income tax under Section 50-5 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

(b) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short-term borrowings in current liabilities on the Statement of Financial Position.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(c) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis or fair value as indicated less where applicable, less depreciation and impairment losses.

Property, plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount and impairment losses are recognised either in profit or loss or as a revaluation decrease if the impairment losses relate to a revalued asset. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present (refer to Note 1(f) for details of impairment).

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the club and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are recognised as expenses in profit or loss in the financial period in which they are incurred.

Plant and equipment that have been contributed at no cost or for nominal cost are recognised at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including capitalised leased assets, is depreciated on a diminishing value basis over their estimated useful lives to the club commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of assets are:

Buildings	2.5%
Buildings improvements	5-20%

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposal are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are included in the statement of profit and loss and other comprehensive income.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(d) Leases

At inception, the Club considers whether a contract is, or contains a lease. A lease is defined as 'a contract, or part of a contract, that conveys the right to use an asset (the underlying asset) for a period of time in exchange for consideration'.

To apply this definition the Club assesses whether the contract meets three key evaluations which are whether:

- the contract contains an identified asset, which is either explicitly identified in the contract or implicitly specified by being identified at the time the asset is made available to the Club;
- the Club has the right to obtain substantially all of the economic benefits from use of the identified asset throughout the period of use, considering its rights within the defined scope of the contract;
- the Club has the right to direct the use of the identified asset throughout the period of use. The Club assess whether it has the right to direct 'how and for what purpose' the asset is used throughout the period of use.

Measurement and recognition of leases as a lessee

At lease commencement date, the Club recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability on the balance sheet. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which is made up of the initial measurement of the lease liability, any initial direct costs incurred by the Club, an estimate of any costs to dismantle and remove the asset at the end of the lease, and any lease payments made in advance of the lease commencement date (net of any incentives received).

The Club depreciates the right-of-use assets on a straight-line basis from the lease commencement date to the earlier of the end of the useful life of the right-of-use asset or the end of the lease term. The Club also assesses the right-of-use asset for impairment when such indicators exist. At the commencement date, the Club measures the lease liability at the present value of the lease payments unpaid at that date, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease if that rate is readily available or the Club's incremental borrowing rate.

Lease payments included in the measurement of the lease liability are made up of fixed payments (including in substance fixed), variable payments based on an index or rate, amounts expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee and payments arising from options reasonably certain to be exercised.

Subsequent to initial measurement, the liability will be reduced for payments made and increased for interest. It is remeasured to reflect any reassessment or modification, or if there are changes in in-substance fixed payments. When the lease liability is remeasured, the corresponding adjustment is reflected in the right-of-use asset, or profit and loss if the right-of-use asset is already reduced to zero.

(d) Leases (continued)

The Club has elected to account for short-term leases and leases of low-value assets using the practical expedients. Instead of recognising a right-of-use asset and lease liability, the payments in relation to these are recognised as an expense in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the lease term. On the statement of financial position, right-of-use assets have been included in property, plant and equipment and lease liabilities have been included in trade and other payables.

The Club as a lessor

As a lessor, the Club classifies its leases as either operating or finance leases. A lease is classified as a finance lease if it transfers substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership of the underlying asset and classified as an operating lease if it does not.

(e) Financial Instruments

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the association becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is the date that the association commits itself to either the purchase or sale of the asset (ie trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments (except for trade receivables) are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs, except where the instrument is classified "at fair value through profit or loss", in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Trade receivables are initially measured at the transaction price if the trade receivables do not contain significant financing component or if the practical expedient was applied as specified in AASB 15: Revenue from Contracts with Customers.

Classification and Subsequent Measurement of Financial Assets

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are subsequently measured at:

- amortised cost; or
- fair value through profit or loss.

A financial liability is measured at fair value through profit or loss if the financial liability is:

- a contingent consideration of an acquirer in a business combination to which AASB 3: Business Combinations applies;
- held for trading; or
- initially designated as at fair value through profit or loss.

(e) Financial Instruments (Continued)

All other financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a debt instrument and of allocating interest expense over in profit or loss over the relevant period.

The effective interest rate is the internal rate of return of the financial asset or liability. That is, it is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash flows through the expected life of the instrument to the net carrying amount at initial recognition.

A financial liability is held for trading if it is:

- incurred for the purpose of repurchasing or repaying in the near term;
- part of a portfolio where there is an actual pattern of short-term profit-taking; or
- a derivative financial instrument (except for a derivative that is in a financial guarantee contract or a derivative that is in effective hedging relationships).

Any gains or losses arising on changes in fair value are recognised in profit or loss to the extent that they are not part of a designated hedging relationship.

The change in fair value of the financial liability attributable to changes in the issuer's credit risk is taken to other comprehensive income and is not subsequently reclassified to profit or loss. Instead, it is transferred to retained earnings upon derecognition of the financial liability.

If taking the change in credit risk in other comprehensive income enlarges or creates an accounting mismatch, then these gains or losses should be taken to profit or loss rather than other comprehensive income.

A financial liability cannot be reclassified.

Financial asset

Financial assets are subsequently measured at:

- amortised cost;
- fair value through other comprehensive income; or
- fair value through profit or loss

Measurement is on the basis of two primary criteria:

- the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset; and
- the business model for managing the financial assets.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(e) Financial Instruments (Continued)

A financial asset that meets the following conditions is subsequently measured at amortised cost:

- the financial asset is managed solely to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms within the financial asset give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding on specified dates.

A financial asset that meets the following conditions is subsequently measured at other comprehensive income:

- the contractual terms within the financial asset give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding on specified dates; and
- the business model for managing the financial asset comprises both contractual cash flows collection and the selling of the financial asset.

By default, all other financial assets that do not meet the measurement conditions of amortised cost and fair value through other comprehensive income are subsequently measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The association initially designates a financial instrument as measured at fair value through profit or loss if:

- it eliminates or significantly reduces a measurement or recognition inconsistency (often referred to as an “accounting mismatch”) that would otherwise arise from measuring assets or liabilities or recognising the gains and losses on them on different bases;
- it is in accordance with the documented risk management or investment strategy and information about the groupings is documented appropriately, so the performance of the financial liability that is part of a group of financial liabilities or financial assets can be managed and evaluated consistently on a fair value basis; and
- it is a hybrid contract that contains an embedded derivative that significantly modifies the cash flows otherwise required by the contract.

The initial designation of financial instruments to measure at fair value through profit or loss is a one-time option on initial classification and is irrevocable until the financial asset is derecognised.

Equity instruments

At initial recognition, as long as the equity instrument is not held for trading or not a contingent consideration recognised by an acquirer in a business combination to which AASB 3 applies, the association made an irrevocable election to measure any subsequent changes in fair value of the equity instruments in other comprehensive income, while the dividend revenue received on underlying equity instruments investment will still be recognised in profit or loss.

Regular way purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised and derecognised at settlement date in accordance with the association's accounting policy.

Derecognition

Derecognition refers to the removal of a previously recognised financial asset or financial liability from the statement of financial position.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

A liability is derecognised when it is extinguished (ie when the obligation in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires). An exchange of an existing financial liability for a new one with substantially modified terms, or a substantial modification to the terms of a financial liability, is treated as an extinguishment of the existing liability and recognition of a new financial liability.

The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable, including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

Derecognition of financial assets

A financial asset is derecognised when the holder's contractual rights to its cash flows expires, or the asset is transferred in such a way that all the risks and rewards of ownership are substantially transferred.

All the following criteria need to be satisfied for the derecognition of a financial asset:

- the right to receive cash flows from the asset has expired or been transferred;
- all risk and rewards of ownership of the asset have been substantially transferred; and
- the association no longer controls the asset (ie has no practical ability to make unilateral decision to sell the asset to a third party).

On derecognition of a financial asset measured at amortised cost, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss.

On derecognition of a debt instrument classified as fair value through other comprehensive income, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the investment revaluation reserve is reclassified to profit or loss.

On derecognition of an investment in equity which the association elected to classify under fair value through other comprehensive income, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the investment's revaluation reserve is not reclassified to profit or loss, but is transferred to retained earnings.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(e) Financial Instruments (Continued)

Impairment

The association recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses on:

- financial assets that are measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income;
- lease receivables;
- contract assets (eg amount due from customers under construction contracts);
- loan commitments that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss; and
- financial guarantee contracts that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss.

Loss allowance is not recognised for:

- financial assets measured at fair value through profit or loss; or
- equity instruments measured at fair value through other comprehensive income.

Expected credit losses are the probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of a financial instrument. A credit loss is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due and all cash flows expected to be received, all discounted at the original effective interest rate of the financial instrument.

The association uses the following approaches to impairment, as applicable under AASB 9: Financial Instruments:

- the general approach;
- the simplified approach;
- the purchased or originated credit-impaired approach; and
- low credit risk operational simplification.

General approach

Under the general approach, at each reporting period, the association assesses whether the financial instruments are credit-impaired, and:

- if the credit risk of the financial instrument has increased significantly since initial recognition, the association measures the loss allowance of the financial instruments at an amount equal to the lifetime expected credit losses; and
- if there is no significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, the association measures the loss allowance for that financial instrument at an amount equal to 12-month expected credit losses.

Simplified approach

The simplified approach does not require tracking of changes in credit risk at every reporting period, but instead requires the recognition of lifetime expected credit loss at all times.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(e) Financial Instruments (Continued)

This approach is applicable to:

- trade receivables; and
- lease receivables.

In measuring the expected credit loss, a provision matrix for trade receivables is used taking into consideration various data to get to an expected credit loss (ie diversity of its customer base, appropriate groupings of its historical loss experience, etc).

Purchased or originated credit-impaired approach

For financial assets that are considered to be credit-impaired (not on acquisition or originations), the association measures any change in its lifetime expected credit loss as the difference between the asset's gross carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate. Any adjustment is recognised in profit or loss as an impairment gain or loss.

Evidence of credit impairment includes:

- significant financial difficulty of the issuer or borrower;
- a breach of contract (eg default or past due event);
- a lender has granted to the borrower a concession, due to the borrower's financial difficulty, that the lender would not otherwise consider;
- the likelihood that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation;
- and
- the disappearance of an active market for the financial asset because of financial difficulties.

Low credit risk operational simplification approach

If a financial asset is determined to have low credit risk at the initial reporting date, the association assumes that the credit risk has not increased significantly since initial recognition and, accordingly, can continue to recognise a loss allowance of 12-month expected credit loss.

To make such a determination that the financial asset has low credit risk, the association applies its internal credit risk ratings or other methodologies using a globally comparable definition of low credit risk.

A financial asset is considered to have low credit risk if:

- there is a low risk of default by the borrower;
- the borrower has a strong capacity to meet its contractual cash flow obligations in the near term; and
- adverse changes in economic and business conditions in the longer term may, but will not necessarily, reduce the ability of the borrower to fulfil its contractual cash flow obligations.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(e) Financial Instruments (Continued)

A financial asset is not considered to carry low credit risk merely due to existence of collateral, or because a borrower has a lower risk of default than the risk inherent in the financial assets, or relative to the credit risk of the jurisdiction in which it operates.

Recognition of expected credit losses in financial statements

At each reporting date, the association recognises the movement in the loss allowance as an impairment gain or loss in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

The carrying amount of financial assets measured at amortised cost includes the loss allowance relating to that asset.

Assets measured at fair value through other comprehensive income are recognised at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in other comprehensive income. The amount in relation to change in credit risk is transferred from other comprehensive income to profit or loss at every reporting period.

For financial assets that are unrecognised (eg loan commitments yet to be drawn, financial guarantees), a provision for loss allowance is created in the statement of financial position to recognise the loss allowance.

(f) Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the club reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less cost to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the assets carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the statement of comprehensive income.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the club estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

(g) Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the club's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may not satisfy vesting requirements. Those cash outflows are discounted using market yields on corporate bonds with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cash flows attributable to employee benefits. Contributions are made by the club to employee superannuation funds and are charged as expenses when incurred.

(h) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the club has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(i) Revenue Recognition

Contributed Assets

The club receives assets from the government and other parties from time to time for nil or nominal consideration in order to further its objectives. These assets are recognised in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable accounting standards (for example AASB 9, AASB 16, AASB 116 and AASB 138.)

On initial recognition of an asset, the club recognises related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer).

The club recognises income immediately in profit or loss as the difference between initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amount.

Operating Grants, Donations and Bequests

When the club receives operating grant revenue, donations or bequests, it assesses whether the contract is enforceable and has sufficiently specific performance obligations in accordance with AASB 15.

When both these conditions are satisfied, the club: - identifies each performance obligation relating to the grant - recognises a contract liability for its obligations under the agreement

- recognises revenue as it satisfies its performance obligations. Where the contract is not enforceable or does not have sufficiently specific performance obligations, the club:
- recognises the asset received in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable accounting standards (for example, AASB 9, AASB 16, AASB 116 and AASB 138)
- recognises related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer)
- recognises income immediately in profit or loss as the difference between the initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amount.

(i) Revenue Recognition (continued)

If a contract liability is recognised as a related amount above, the club recognises income in profit or loss when or as it satisfies its obligations under the contract.

Capital Grant

When the club receives a capital grant, it recognises a liability for the excess of the initial carrying amount of the financial asset received over any related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer) recognised under other Australian Accounting Standards.

The club recognises income in profit or loss when or as the club satisfies its obligations under the terms of the grant.

Interest Income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

Revenue from the sale of goods

Revenue from sale of goods comprises revenue earned from sale of goods donated and resale. Sales revenue is recognised when the control of goods passes to the customer.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST) where applicable.

(j) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities, which are recoverable from or payable to the ATO, are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

(k) Trade and Other Receivables

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from customers for goods sold in the ordinary course of business. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Accounts receivable are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

(l) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated costs of completion and selling expenses.

(m) Trade and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the club during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(n) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The Board of Management evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the club.

Key Estimates – Impairment

The Board of Management assess impairment at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the club that may lead to the impairment of assets. Where an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. Value-in-use calculations performed in assessing recoverable amounts incorporate a number of key estimates.

No impairment has been recognised in respect of the current year.

Performance obligations under AASB 15

To identify a performance obligation under AASB 15, the promise must be sufficiently specific to be able to determine when the obligation is satisfied. Management exercises judgement to determine whether the promise is sufficiently specific by taking into account any conditions specified in the arrangement, explicit or implicit, regarding the promised goods or services. In making this assessment, management includes the nature/ type, cost/ value, quantity and the period of transfer related to the goods or services promised.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(o) Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities

The club measures some of its assets and liabilities at fair value on either a recurring or nonrecurring basis, depending on the requirements of the applicable Accounting Standard.

Fair value is the price the club would receive to sell an asset or would have to pay to transfer a liability in an orderly (i.e. unforced) transaction between independent, knowledgeable and willing market participants at the measurement date.

As fair value is a market-based measure, the closest equivalent observable market pricing information is used to determine fair value. Adjustments to market values may be made having regard to the characteristics of the specific asset or liability. The fair values of assets and liabilities that are not traded in an active market are determined using one or more valuation techniques. These valuation techniques maximise, to the extent possible, the use of observable market data.

(p) Economic Dependence

The Club is dependent upon the ongoing receipt of donations and rental income from Metropolitan Caloundra Surf Life Saving Supporters Club to ensure the ongoing continuance of its operations. At the date of this report, the Board of Management has no reason to believe that this financial support will not continue.

(q) New and Amended Accounting Policies Adopted by the Club

The club has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Auditor's Opinion

We have audited the financial report of Metropolitan Caloundra Surf Life Saving Club Inc (the "Association"), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 April 2024 and the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, statement of cash flows for the year then ended and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, and the Board of Management's declaration.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial report of Metropolitan Caloundra Surf Life Saving Club Inc is in accordance with the the *Australian Charities and Not for Profit Act 2012*, including:

- (i) giving a true and fair view of the Association's financial position as at 30 April 2024 and of its performance for the year ended on that date; and
- (ii) complying with Australian Accounting Standards – Simplified Disclosures and the *Australian Charities and Not for Profit Regulation 2022*.

Other Information

The Board of Management of the Association are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Association's annual report for the year ended 30 April 2024, but does not include the financial report and our auditor's report thereon. Our opinion on the financial report does not cover the other information and accordingly we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon. In connection with our audit of the financial report, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial report or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact.

We have nothing to report in this regard.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. We are independent of the Association in accordance with the auditor independence requirements of section 60-40 of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012* and the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110: *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibility of the Board of Management of the Association for the Financial Report

The Board of Management of the Association are responsible for the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Simplified Disclosures and the *Australian Charities and Not for Profit Act 2012* and for such internal control as the Board of Management determine is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial report, the Board of Management are responsible for assessing the Association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Board of Management either intend to liquidated the Association or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Report

Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Association to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure, and content of the financial report, including the disclosures, and whether the financial report represents the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.
